Nature's creatures abundant on new issues

The Royal Canadian Mint's September catalogue includes the corporation's second barn owl coin.

The new coin, the 12th in the Birds of Canada series, is a coloured 25-cent piece showing a bird in full flight in a rural setting.

Designed by Trevor Tennant, the coin is struck on cupro-nickel blanks, with a diameter of 35 millimetres. The mintage is 17,500.

The barn owl, the only species of owl that does not hoot, has a limited Canadian habitat. They are only found in British Columbia and the southern-most tip of Ontario.

The previous barn owl coin was issued in 2010, as part of a series on Canada's wildlife conservation.

The second coin in the Canadian Maple Canopy Series features an autumn setting.

The \$3 gold coin was designed by Christie Pacquet. The tiny, 27.1 mm square coin, was struck in sterling silver and is gold-plated. Barn owls are listed as endangered species in Canada.



UNDER THE CANOPY
The second coin in the Canadian Maple Canopy series shows an autumn setting.

The coloured coin is similar to the first coin in the series, which showed a summer canopy, with a view from the ground close to the tree looking upwards. In this case the branches are bare, with two red and gold leaves falling to the ground.

The .9999 silver coin was designed by Margaret Best, and has a diameter of 38 mm and weight of 31.39 grams, one troy ounce. The mintage limit of the \$20 coin is 7,500. The first coin in the series sold out in just a week.

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Birth of Prince George inspires Cacuck issues

In an Aug. 8 ceremony at Rideau Hall in Ottawa, Governor General David Johnston unveiled Canada's coins celebrating the birth of Prince George of Cambridge.

Johnston was joined at the event by Shelly Glover, minister of Canadian Heritage and Official Languages, and Royal Canadian Mint president and CEO Ian Bennett.

"Canadians are delighted with the recent arrival of the Duke and Duchess of Cam-

bridge's first child, who will someday be sovereign of Canada," said Glover. "These exceptional collector coins produced by the Royal Canadian Mint highlight, through artistic elements, the enduring relationship Canada shares with the Royal Family."

"Each one of these special commemorative coins is struck with the pride and craftsmanship befitting a future king," added Bennett.

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A silver \$5 shows a gold-plated monogrammed 'W' and 'C' with crowns, representing the ciphers of the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge.

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In November of 2012, the Royal Canadian Mint, together with the Bank of Canada, announced that the Bank of Canada was selling their gold reserves consisting of 1912, 1913, and 1914 \$5 and \$10 gold coins. These coins were sold through the Royal Canadian Mint, and many sold out very quickly. The Royal Canadian Mint sold coins and sets in Hand-Select, and Premium Select designations, without grading the coins.

Who knew? Circulating coins tiny ambassadors, too

For me, the first sure sign of the end of summer is the presence of the first lunar zodiac coins.

Granted, the coins are now unveiled some four months before the actual event, but in the cycle of life here at *CCN*, they indicate that August is drawing to a close.

There is a pattern, to the second half of summer: RCNA, ANA, lunars, Labour Day.

The irony is that some 20 years ago, the idea that the Royal Canadian Mint would be issuing lunar zodiac coins would have seemed funny. Back then, we were just getting over the Canada 125 series, a program which saw a whopping 13 commemorative coin issues. When those were added to the usual mint sets, silver aviations, silver dollar, a couple of gold coins, and some platinum art pieces, that was the whole lineup.

Back then, we thought things were getting out of control. But then the market changed.

Somewhere along the line, mints around the world caught on to the idea that many people who are not collectors still like the idea of coins that connect to their life. It wasn't exactly a new idea, it was the reason for the success of the Canada 125 series, the 1967 series, the Montreal and Calgary Olympic coins, and even the 1939 Royal Visit silver dollar, or for that matter, the first Canadian circulating dollar coins, the King George V silver jubilee commemorative of 1935.

So the RCM, as with other mints around the world, began to look at expanding their offerings.

Now I have always been cynical of the idea of gift coins, since they are not always sustainable, but it seems that demand has held steady.

The other development, spearheaded by David Dingwall, master of the mint at the time, was the idea of dropping mintages to ensure sell-outs.

In 2010 the number offerings, fuelled by the Vancouver Olympic Winter Games, got to the point that I had difficulty even remembering what I had covered.

Now this year, we have monthly catalogues, each one with a dozen or more issues.

To be fair, it isn't unusual now to see coins issued in both gold and silver sharing a common design. We also see a reasonable number of base metal coins, often very reasonably priced, which is good for new collectors.

However, what gets me excited is that we also have a program to create new and interesting circulating commemorative coins.

For years, I have been preaching that the best way to attract new collectors is to give them varied pocket change, which they can collect for face value. To me, the reasons are obvious: zero risk, the fun of looking through coins, and the fact that it reaches all Canadians because circulating coins are everywhere. Sure the coins may not be in mint condition, but that only means a prospective collector can actually touch them without worrying about altering a pristine surface.

Each tiny coin is an ambassador for coin collecting. As nice as the non-circulating legal tender stuff is, the folks in Ottawa won't set a foot wrong if they keep on making interesting circulating coins. 🍁

UNIQUE NOTE FOUND

A \$4 banknote from the July 1, 1876 issues of the Consolidated Bank of Canada with a unique GALT overprint in blue has been discovered by an unidentified Canadian numismatist. All \$4 notes by the bank are scarce, many exhibiting "town" overprints, and with most in institutional collections. The bank was formed by the merger of two weak banks, City Bank, Montreal, and the Royal Canadian Bank, Toronto. However the merged institution ceased operations in 1879 with most notes redeemed at that time. The note will be featured in the Oct. 24-25 auction being conducted by Moore's at the downtown Toronto Hilton Hotel. For more information contact the firm by email, moore-coins1921@yahoo.com.

DOUGLAS JOINS BOARD

Geoffrey Bell, chairman of the J. Douglas Ferguson Historical Research Foundation, has announced that Scott Douglas has been appointed to its board of directors. Scott has served as president of several Ontario coin clubs and the Buffalo Numismatic Association south of the border. Currently archivist of the Toronto Coin Club and the Buffalo club, Scott has been a regular contributor to the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association *Journal* and numerous other numismatic publications with well-written pieces of research. Scott is currently Canadian Numismatic Research Society president. His 58-page booklet on Early Canadian Numismatists and their Tokens won him the Fred Bowman literary award. He was awarded the RCNA Presidential plaque in 2008, the award of

Merit by the Ontario Numismatic Association in 2010, and was elected a Fellow of the ONA in 2013.

NGC EXTENDS GUARANTEE

Numismatic Guaranty Corporation has announced that its guarantee of grade and authenticity has been expanded to cover General Services Administration (GSA) Hoard Morgan dollars that have been graded by NGC in their original black GSA holders. This update will be applied retroactively to include all NGC-certified GSA Morgan dollars and will supersede the language on the back of the NGC GSA certification label. These coins were encapsulated in hard plastic holders with black inserts and sold to the public from 1972 to 1980. Since Jan. 1, 2003, NGC has graded silver dollars in the original GSA holders by affixing a tamper-evident label that wraps around the rigid case. This special label bears the coin description and NGC grade while still preserving the historic significance of the GSA holder. To date, NGC has graded nearly 100,000 Morgan dollars in GSA holders.

TICF wooden token carries quite a punch

The Friday evening dealer receptions at the Toronto International Coin Fair (TICF), held at the Lakeshore Inn, were a very popular event, with complimentary hot hors d'oeuvres

and every refreshment you could possibly want.

Starting in 1985, a huge bowl sat on a table in the middle of the Diefenbaker Suite. When the recep-

tion started, a lot of dealers headed straight for the punch bowl rather than the open bar.

Walter Ciona, who was responsible for mixing the contents of the punch, was continuously asked for the recipe. Rather than just telling people or handing out a written sheet, he gave them a wooden "flat" which spelled out the ingredients. TICF printed 100 of the woods for Ciona to pass out.

When you look at the ingredients, you can understand why the punch was so popular.

Except maybe he should have left out the three bottles of ginger ale!

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The token helps explain the popularity of the punch at the 1985 TICF dealer reception.

Scrip offers glimpse into colonial Canada's working class



Notes & BILLS

This column is being written right after I have returned home from the 60th annual convention of the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association in Winnipeg. I enjoyed the event immensely and feel that the Winnipeg organizing committee deserves a lot of credit for their hard work. If you didn't attend the convention, you will never know what paper money additions to your collection you might have missed. For example, I was fortunate to be able to purchase three scrip notes of colonial Canada, which are now proudly housed in my collection.

Every student of Canadian colonial numismatic history is aware of the chronic shortage of hard cash that plagued our founding colonies, due to the imbalance between the goods and supplies needed on this side of the Atlantic versus the money available to send back to England to pay for them. This disparity frequently resulted in a shortage of money available for local commerce. As a result colonists were forced to use their initiative in finding cash for local transactions.

Their responses to this need have left us a wide-ranging legacy of colonial money to collect, including a variety of foreign coins of various denominations (including some counterfeit English coppers), numerous types of tokens that were either imported or made locally, the various Blacksmith tokens, and when times were really desperate the buttons from military uniforms that had their shanks removed, then were flattened and circulated as halfpennies.

Some merchants responded by issuing paper promissory notes, which can be categorized into different types, such as "bons" (from the French promise they bore, "Bon Pour," or "good for") a specific product or service, as opposed to notes that were redeemable by the issuer for specific cash amounts.

An example of the former is the Dumoulin handwritten issues of 1794-96. Pierre Dumoulin, a baker in Longueuil, Lower Canada, issued handwritten notes for loaves of bread on scraps of paper. The example in my collection is written in pencil and reads

"Bon pour deux pain le / 15 Janvier 1795 / pierre Dumoulin" in three lines. The back is blank. Beginning about 1760 and for the next 180 years or more, some merchants issued printed scrip issues that were redeemable in specific denominations of money. It is not my purpose here to give a detailed general explanation.

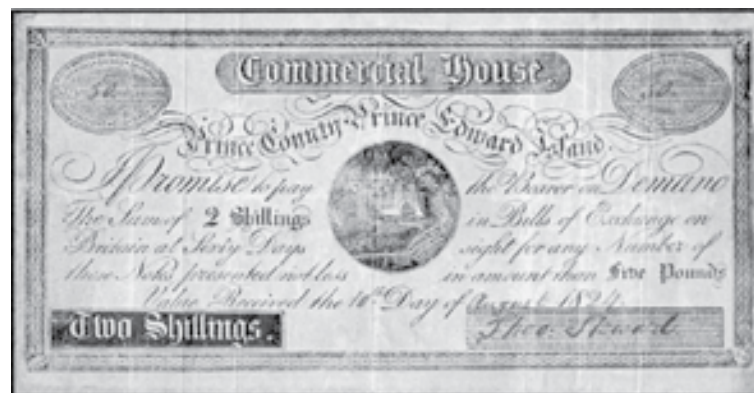
A few years ago the Charlton Press published an excellent book, the *Charlton Standard Catalogue of Canadian Merchant Scrip*, authored by Canadian paper money expert R.J. Graham. This book does not include "bons" or other paper issues that were not intended to provide an alternate currency. However, it is a superb source of information about true merchant scrip issued in Canada, and I heartily recommend that any collector or student of the subject purchase a copy for his or her personal numismatic library.

The informative book provides a guideline to prices of the various issues. One of the notes I bought from a bourse dealer at the recent RCNA convention is a generally square-shaped paper note in the amount of 15 sols issued by the firm of Dobie & Badgley of Montreal, fur merchants (buyers and sellers) and fur trade suppliers. The text on the front of the note is entirely in French and is contained within an ornate square frame. The note is dated at Montreal on the first day of May 1790 and is denominated in the amount of 15 sols, payable on sight. It has a serial number at the bottom left and is signed "Dobie & Badgley"

at the right. At the same convention I obtained from another dealer two remainder notes (\$2 and \$5) from the Montreal firm of Cuvillier & Sons, which had been intended for issue in 1838. There was also a \$1 note in this series. Cuvillier had previously circulated scrip notes denominated in pence amounts. However, after the dollar notes had been printed, the law was changed to outlaw private scrip. Henceforth, only banks would be allowed

Brunet dit Letang of Pointe Claire, Lower Canada; the 12-sous and one-chelin (or 24-sous) notes of W.U. Chauffers of St. Cesaire, Lower Canada; the 1837 60-sous notes of St. Benoit merchant James Watts (a rebel and participant in the Rebellion of 1837); the various scrip issues of the Molsons in 1837; and the issues of W& J Bell in Perth, Upper Canada.

There have been many merchants who have issued scrip throughout Canada, with the

to issue notes. As a result, most examples of this dollar series that survive are unused remainders, with signed and dated examples being rarely encountered.

The financial crisis of 1837-39 and the suspension of specie payment that resulted led many firms to issue their own scrip notes in order to help the populace survive financially and keep the economy working. Consequently there is a substantial number of different issues known from this period, including the six-, 12-, 15-, 20-, 30- and 60-sous notes of Eustache

largest numbers of issues having been circulated by businesses in Quebec, Ontario, and the Atlantic provinces. Many are extremely rare or even unique. This is a fascinating field within the larger hobby of paper money collecting, and one that has surged in popularity in the years since the Charlton catalogue's publication.

One of the things I like best about merchant scrip is that it gives the serious collector glimpses of ordinary people in business communities throughout colonial Canada,

Collecting 101

Coin savers come in three different types. Most of us fall into the category of "pure collector." We collect for the enjoyment, romance and history that coins afford. If we have any thought of future remuneration, it is kept in the background. It is our hobby, pure and simple.

Yet there are certain points about the other two categorizations that might describe some of us. Where do you fit in?

The collector is someone who systematically acquires coins with clearly defined goals in mind. The goal may be to complete a date set in a particular denomination. It could be the formation of a "type set" or the purchase of one of each design type in every denomination. Or it might be something else. Whatever the choice, there is a purpose to the collection.

A coin accumulator, on the other hand, obtains coins in a haphazard fashion without any particular thought as to organization or arrangement. More is better so to speak. This individual can also be described as a pack rat, or someone who accumulates just to have it. No thought is given to disposal.

A coin investor tends to focus attention on the future financial gains of the coins they obtain. Any interest in collecting enjoyment comes in a distant second, if at all.

It could be said that there is a fourth type of individual. Per-

haps many of us fall into the category of "collector/investor." If you forced me into a wager, I would suggest that most of us are in this fourth category.

Once we get beyond the point of filling in those coin boards from our pocket change, and begin spending our hard-earned money on the more expensive empty slots in our albums, let's face it, we have at least one eye focused on the future. We don't simply buy a coin with the idea that, "I don't care if I ever get anything back for this coin down the road." Being human, we are concerned with our expenditures; perhaps not so much as, "What will I get for this coin in five years?" but "What is the most I could lose?"

Returning to the pure collector for a moment, value is not the primary reason he or she collects. There are so many positives such as the art, beauty and history of coins. These considerations result in the "romance of coin collecting."

Coins are indeed miniature works of art. They appeal to us much in the same manner as a Rembrandt would to an art aficionado. Coins bespeak beauty and who would deny their historical aspects? Was that silver denarius once held by Julius Caesar?

As to the value of coins as being the prime allure to the investor, or at least of some concern to the collector/investor, here are

Coins are indeed miniature works of art. They appeal to us much in the same manner as a Rembrandt would to an art aficionado. Coins bespeak beauty and who would deny their historical aspects? Was that silver denarius once held by Julius Caesar?

three "keys to determining future price appreciation."

- The level of preservation and appearance. Are there any nicks, rim bumps, gouges or scratches? Does the coin exhibit any noticeable flaw(s) such as carbon spots, tarnish, or PVC damage? Most importantly, does the coin have great "eye-appeal?" In other words, when you look at the coin is your first thought "Wow!?"

- The available supply. If 500,000 of a particular coin exist for collectors and just 50,000 collectors "want" the coin, the coin's value will most likely remain dormant regardless of the coin's eye-appeal.

- The demand factor. Conversely, if 50,000 coins of that date and type are available and 100,000 collectors are desirous of obtaining an example, the demand far exceeds the supply and the value of said coin will in all likelihood continue to post modest annual gains. This is especially so if the coin has great eye-appeal.

We stated earlier that the collector acquires coins in a systematic manner with certain goals in mind. This individual follows his or her own blueprint and, over many months or years, will form a very meaningful collection. By choosing quality and, if necessary, paying a bit over market for an exceptional coin, the collector can have his or her cake and eat it too, to borrow an old phrase. The cake being the coin while

eating it refers to the financial gain in the future.

The investor does not have this ability, for there is no acquired knowledge of coins. He or she buys haphazardly, usually relying on a "tip sheet" or recommendation from dubious sources. I am always amazed at the fact that a stock market investor will obtain several printed journals to study the corporation in whose stock there is an interest, but no such research on coins or the coin market is prepared.

We will not discuss the accumulator any further. We have tried before and the words seem to fall on deaf ears. We keep trying to say, "Collect in a meaningful way."

Remember to purchase prudently and to avoid flawed or damaged coins at all costs. Read as much as you can in your fields of interest and by all means keep your subscription to *Canadian Coin News* up to date.

apart from what the notes printed by the banks and governments show us. 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Errors & VARIETIES

By John Regitko

There are some wonderful errors listed on the Internet. However, I have come across a number of write-ups that, I suggest, might benefit from a revision to the wording for clarification. And if the sellers are serious about selling the coin, it might be useful for them to reconsider their asking price. Here are a few examples.

2007 CANADA LOONIE \$1 'THE WAVE' ERROR UNIQUE

An eBay listing of a 2007 \$1 error coin by "themansionshop" referred to as "The

Wave" is shown in Figure 1. It is described as "Unique," which I doubt, because it is highly unlikely that a die break occurred as severe as this in one fell swoop, rather than progressively.

Even if it came about all at once as "unique" would imply (although this is the Internet), would blanks be struck with this defective die, get noticed by the pressman or quality control supervisor, who would remove the die and find and destroy all coins struck by the defective die, except this one? I doubt that!

He is asking \$8,799 for it, plus \$12 shipping. Wow. On that basis, I don't think it really matters how it is described.

2006 MAGNETIC NO P NO LOGO NO COPPER CENT

A listing on eBay by "larylary999" lists a "Canada One cent 2006 Magnetic No P No Logo No Copper Very Rare Error" coin. The description is "Monster Error no copper plated and doubling on 6." Opening bid is \$5,000. Phew!

When I accessed the listing, it showed that 15 offers had been received. Wow! I wonder how much below the opening bid they were? Or has it turned out to be so scarce since the 2013 Charlton catalogue came out that showed a \$600 value, that it has skyrocketed so much? The coin is shown in Figure 2.

One of the items I include in the Error and Variety Manual is a business card-size listing of the scarce Canadian cents from 2006, shown in Figure 3.

The information on the cards is courtesy of Joe Kennedy, confirmed by the Charlton coin catalogue. One of the rare ones is indeed the 2006 magnetic cent that does not contain a P or the Royal Canadian Mint logo.

Feel free to reproduce the card and keep one in your wallet or purse for ready reference when you come across some cents when visiting friends or relatives that probably have hoarded some, thinking that all cents will be

rare "because they are not making them anymore."

ONE OF A KIND ERROR MORGAN SILVER DOLLAR

A listing from "zt9" describes the 1887P Morgan dollar shown in Figure 4 as follows: "This is a 1887 P Morgan Silver Dollar with some light toning, I will not attempt to grade the coin as grading is subjective. I have never seen a coin like this before. The 87 P has an error none as the 7 over 6 which is in the Redbook. This one is different look at the close up of the date and you can see between the 8's what looks like a 6 to me. So is this the 7 over 6 and the planchet moved during the strike???"

"That is just my guess I really don't know all that much about how they make coins, I have been around machine shops and have a little understanding of how dies work. Whatever it is I would think this would be a one of a kind Morgan Dollar. Please feel free to ask any questions or give me your opinion."

Alright, since you want people to ask questions and give opinions, here are a few:

Why is no close-up shown in the listing, just the whole image of the coin as shown in Figure 4, so that people can see for themselves what you are describing?

How exactly did the planchet "move" during the strike, as you state, to create the 7 over 6, while nothing else is doubled? Oh, I know. It is just a guess on your part because you don't know much about how they make coins.

If this is die-related as you surmise, why would you think it is one of a kind and not something that is struck over and over and over again? Oh, I know. Because you have never seen a coin like this before.

If you think grading is subjective and not standardized, why not send it to one of the U.S. grading services who can allay all doubt in a potential bidder's mind as to what condition the coin is in? Oh, I know. Because either you know the condition is not so great, or at your starting bid of \$89,999.99, you can hardly afford to spend a few dollars to have it graded and certified.

What makes you think that because it is not listed in the *Red Book* (hundreds of other known die varieties are also not listed), that it is worth so much more than similar die varieties that were documented by Leroy C. Van Allen and A. George Mallis (hence known as VAMs) and later in a book by Michael S. Fey? Oh,

I know. Because you think the Red Book lists all known varieties and if it is not listed, it must be worth a fortune, ignoring the extensive listings in specialized catalogs.

The saying "buy the book before you buy the coin" also applies to those that already own the coin and wish to know its approximate value.

I would also like to confirm that this die variety is not as "unique" as the seller would like us to believe.

1961 ONE-CENT OLD COIN

An eBay listing by "slimnuggets" from New York state shows a heading of "Penny 1961 Canada 1-cent Del Gratia Regina Elizabeth I I." Note that it is not "II" as on the coin, but two Latin capital letters iota. The only photo appearing with the listing is shown in Figure 5.

I wondered what was wrong with it due to the starting bid of \$30. The full description of "Old Canadian Coin" was of no help. The "No Returns Accepted" comment did not convince me to place a bid either. Can you tell what is wrong with it?

Answer: Nothing! It is just an "old Canadian coin" as stated! For \$30, I expect it to contain a nice die break, be



off-centre, struck with a rotated die, or something similar.

Because the coin was photographed with a digital camera with which you could only get so close to the object, the coin takes up a very tiny portion of the illustration, making it useless to see detail even if it did contain a desirable error.

This reminds me of the time in 2006 when I received a telephone call from a lady who told me she had "a really old coin," a 1940 cent and wondered what it is worth. "They're not making them any more, you know!" she said. I responded: "They are not making 2005 cents any more either, but that doesn't make them valuable."

1948 ROTATED DIES & TWO KNOWN DIE CRACK VARIETIES

Although I have no problem with the \$130 "buy it now" price in the eBay listing by "blondiadog-us" for the coin shown in Figure 6, I do have a few questions about the description.

It reads: "Very rare Canadian rotated dies and two known die crack varieties in one Royal Canadian Mint error. Unique 1948 NGC MS63 Canada nickel with rotated dies, die crack under the King and a die crack after the star on the right. Their price guide just for the 2 die crack varieties in MS63 is \$200.00, not counting the rotated dies!"

I always wonder how sellers know their coins are unique.

And I wonder if one of the coins with only the two die cracks actually

sold for anywhere near \$200 just because a price guide lists it as such. I assume the seller knows that price guides do not buy or sell coins because he/she is prepared to discount it drastically.

I also wondered if I blew up the illustrations from the listing as shown in Figure 6, if I could see any die cracks due to the poor quality of the photo. I could not.

TV shows such as *Pawn Stars* and *Hardcore Pawn* have customers coming

in with all kinds of collectibles and quoting asking prices from Internet sites. Invariably the pawn shop representative asks if that is the actual selling price or just an asking price. The answer is always the same: it is the asking price. They can never direct the store to a site that shows actual selling prices that are anywhere near the asking price. Keep that in mind when deciding what an item is really worth. 🍁

The offerings consist of two coins and a three-coin set, all designed by Laurie McGaw.

The first coin is a .9999 silver \$5 piece with selective gold plating.

The reverse image features a gold-plated monogrammed "W" and "C" with crowns, representing the ciphers of the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge, flanked by maple leaves. The design is bordered by an ornate ring with all the accoutrements of life with a newborn: baby rattles, plush toys, bibs, soothers, sippy cups and tiny shoes and socks mixed with moons and stars. The year 2013 appears below the initials and the word "CANADA" above.

The RCM produced one of these coins in full gold plating, to be forwarded to the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge as a special keepsake.

The second coin is a 25-cent cupro-nickel coin featuring a baby carriage with the year 2013 engraved above. The pram, adorned by maple leaves, is positioned inside the smallest of three rings nestled within each other to divide the coin into three sections. The middle circle includes tiny beads along its outer edge and is divided vertically, featuring the names "William" on the left and "Catherine" on the right. Monogrammed first letter initials of the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge with crowns (representing the royal couple's ciphers) flank either side of the outermost ring with "CANADA" above and "25 CENTS" below. There is no disclosed mintage limit.

A set of three \$20 coins delivers a trilogy of scenes to express the joy and wonder of the first months with a precious newborn. Struck in .9999 silver, the coin designs are as fol-



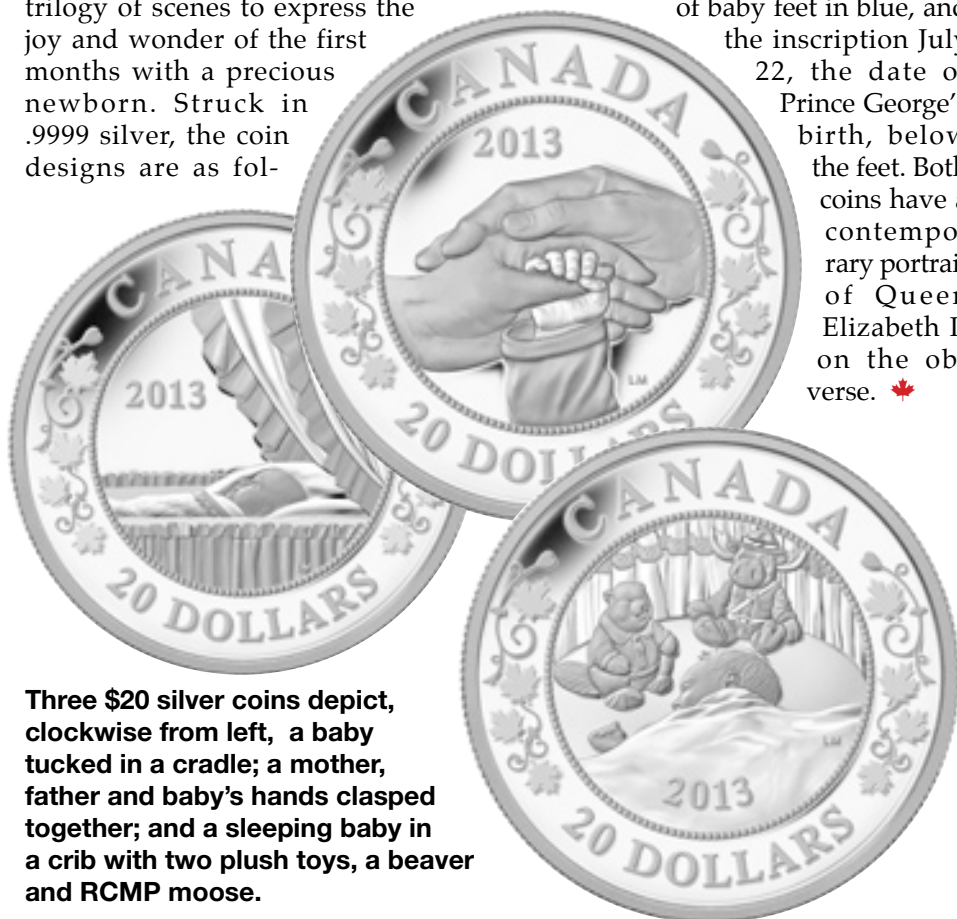

lows: a baby tucked away in a cradle with all the love and lace typical of a royal nursery; three hands (mother, father, and baby's) touching to form a family bond within the shape of a heart; and a sleeping baby in a crib with two plush toys, a beaver and RCMP moose, to represent Canada's close ties with the Royal Family. Each of the three coin designs features maple leaves and "2013" to mark the year of this historic occasion. The set has a mintage of 7,500.

The Canadian announcement was preceded by an issue from the Perth Mint, which released a coin showing the new family on the reverse, and Queen Elizabeth II on the obverse.

The Australian coins consist of 10,000 struck in .999 silver, and 1,000 struck in .999 gold.

The birth was also commemorated by the British Virgin Islands, which authorized two \$10 silver coins. The reverse of one shows the Duke, and the other the Duchess, with a pair of baby feet in blue, and the inscription July 22, the date of Prince George's birth, below the feet. Both coins have a contemporary portrait of Queen Elizabeth II on the obverse. 🍁

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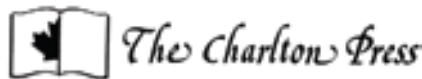

MATED PAIR

The second coin in the four-coin bald eagle series shows a mated pair.

Bald eagles are one of the species of birds that normally takes a single mate for life. Once mated, a pair builds a nest and sets about raising eaglets.

Claudio D'Angelo designed the coin, which shows a pair perched on a rocky shoreline. The mountainous background is reminiscent of the animal's natural habitat. Most bald eagles in Canada are in British Columbia.

The one-ounce coin is struck in .9999 silver, with a mintage limit of 7,500 and a face value of \$20.

The other two coins in the series, returning from the hunt and mother protecting her eaglets, will go on sale later in the year.

Toronto, Miami, Strasbourg, Paris, Shanghai, and New York.

The \$20 coin has a purity of .9999 and mintage limit of 7,500.

ARCTIC EXPEDITION

The RCM has also issued the first Specimen Set containing a silver dollar.

The dollar used in this case is the same design as the silver dollar issued earlier this year to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Canadian Arctic Expedition.

Designed by Bonnie Ross, the coin shows three men standing beside a loaded dogsled. In the background is a skyline and a large compass rose with the needle pointing 10 degrees east of true north, indicative of the difference between true and magnetic north.

The expedition, ordered by Prime Minister Sir Robert Borden, consisted of two parties. The northern party concentrated on exploration and mapping, while the southern party explored the geology, resources, and native population of the northern mainland.



The expedition was lavishly documented, with some 4,000 photographs and more than 2,700 metres of film. Those images were used by Ross to create the coin design.

The dollar is struck in .9999 silver with a diameter of 36.07 mm and weight of 23.17 grams. The other coins in the set are Specimen strikes of the 2013 circulating coins from five cents to \$2.

The mintage limit for the set is 20,000.

ICONIC CARIBOU

Three more coins have been issued in the O Canada series, all three featuring the caribou.

A half-ounce silver coin shows a male caribou standing in a boreal forest, with snow on the ground and pine trees.

It is the eighth half-ounce coin in the series. Struck in .9999 silver, the \$10 coin has a mintage limit of 40,000.

The second coin is a silver one-ounce piece, with a face value of \$25.

The .9999 coin shows a caribou cow and calf in the Canadian north. The two stand in a grass-filled summer valley, with the rest of the herd shown in the background. The mintage limit is 8,500 coins.

The third coin is a \$5 gold piece.

The .9999 Fine coin shows a close-up of the head and neck of a male caribou. The background shows a northern scene, with river and mountains. The mintage limit is 4,000.

Caribou, known as reindeer in Eurasia, are members of the deer family, related to deer, moose and elk. Four subspecies are native to Canada, with a combined population of about 2.4 million animals, one of largest populations in the world. Their hooves are adapted to allow them to

shovel through the snow in winter in order to find food. Their hooves actually alter in length and hardness with the seasons, to give them better traction on the changing environment. They can run as fast as 80 km/h. Modern researchers believe it may be the only mammal able to see ultraviolet light.

As with all coins in the O Canada series, the design includes a element in the border relating to the subject. In the case of these coins it is a caribou hoof print. All three coins were designed by Pierre Leduc, a noted Canadian wildlife artist, who has designed a number of coins for the RCM.

The O Canada series is extensive, with \$10 coins planned on the subject of Maple Leaf, Hockey, and Orca; a \$25 coin and a \$5 coin on the Orca.

LUNAR ZODIAC

The catalogue concludes with a group of Year of the Horse coins. All are dated 2014, making them the first coins of next year to be launched.

The most stunning are a pair of kilogram coins, one in gold and one in silver.

The two coins share a common design, not attributed to a single creator but to Three Degrees Design Group. The Vancouver firm has designed many lunar zodiac coins for the RCM.

The design shows a view of the front half of a rearing horse, the Chinese symbol for horse, and a decorative border.

INVOKING HARMONY

A third once-ounce silver coin is an original design by a contemporary Canadian artist.

The design, by Carlito Dalceggio of Montreal, is entitled "Harmony," and is described as a non-linear myth-scape. The circular design is a circular narrative combining different finishes on a variety of tribal symbols.

Dalceggio trained as a graphic designer, but quickly moved into fine art. He has had solo exhibitions in Montreal,

The War of 1812 was a 32-month military conflict between the United States and the British Empire (now Canada). This coin commemorates two battles that were fought and won by the British Empire; The Battle for Crysler's Farm (also known as the Battle of Crysler's Field) and The Battle of the Chateauguy. The Battle for Crysler's Farm was fought on November 11, 1813 near Cornwall, Ontario. The Battle of the Chateauguy was fought on October 26, 1813 in Allan's Corners, near present-day Ormstown, Quebec.

These two historic battles caused the Americans to abandon the Saint Lawrence Campaign, their major strategic effort in the autumn of 1813.

This special coin, with a special limited mintage of only 10 worldwide (a first for the RCM kilogram gold coins!), is struck in pure .9999 fine gold, and weighs 1 kilogram (1000 grams). The coin features renditions of two historic paintings of each of the two battles, with a map of the region separating the two.

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English-speaking Canada missed out on silver tribute to Cartier

Q. I just read your article on 2006 pennies, so I became inquisitive and looked at a few that I have. Know what? I found two 2005 pennies so far and no mint marks. Was 2006 the only year without marks? If so, how come no one noticed the 2005s? Don't tell me I have made a million.

A. One-cent coins without a mint mark from that era are fairly common. The no mint mark indicates a coin struck on a plated-zinc planchet, while the mint mark indicates a coin struck on a plated-steel planchet. What is remarkable about 2006 is that a small number of one-cent coins were struck without the mint mark, but on steel blanks. Whether the wrong dies were used, or the wrong blanks got in the mix is undetermined, but these coins have become highly sought after.



The Mint earmarked this coin marking the 475th anniversary of Jacques Cartier's arrival at Gaspé, Que. for the Quebec market, and thus, the issue flew under the radar of most collectors, not to mention the numismatic press.

Q. I have this 2009 \$20 pure silver coin commemorating the 475th anniversary of Jacques Cartier's arrival at Gaspé, Que., which was produced by the Royal Canadian Mint. Only 1,534 were minted. I never saw it listed on the Royal Canadian Mint's website or in the newsletter or in catalogues, but it was on the Monnaie Royale Canadienne website in Quebec. I would like to know if this coin is considered to be rare or scarce, when this coin was available for purchasing from the Mint, what the issue price was, and how it was distributed.

A. These coins sort of got out under the radar. The vast majority of them were sold in Quebec almost as soon as they were released. They were not included in the regular Mint coin series of that year and were launched separately, rather than as part of the planned catalogues. As for rarity, the number made is quite low, but demand was also not particularly high and there seems to be enough of them to go about. As modern NCLT, the coins have more limited appeal and a market comparable to other modern issues with similar mintages.

Q. Can you clarify why there are some differences in the mintage numbers (Mint) and sold numbers (Charlton) that we have noticed for silver dollar coins between 2001 and 2012? And what happens to the coins that are not sold? How are they disposed of, put into storage, re-melted, or some other method of disposal? If these differences are real do you not feel that the Mint should readjust the mintage numbers to reflect the differences? Is there a data set available showing any of these differences in mintage and actual sold numbers?

One more observation: The Royal Canadian Mint certificate number on selected issued coins may not be accurate. For example, one of my certificates notes that my coin is No. 8,950 of 10,000. However, there seem to have been only 6,555 sold. How is it that my certificate number is higher than the sold number?

A. The number you refer to as mintage number is actually the mintage limit. It represents the maximum number of coins that can be produced, and it is announced ahead of time.

The number sold represents exactly that, and is announced after sales conclude. In some cases, it takes a bit of time to get that number.

For instance, the Mint usually sells coins for up to 12 months from the issue date. At that date any unsold coins are destroyed. The sold number is published in the tables in the annual report, which comes out once a year. So coins issued in 2013 will remain on sale until 2014, and the final number made will be known when then 2014 report is issued during the first half of 2015.

In some cases the entire mintage sells out.

When the Mint announces a coin, it does not strike the entire mintage limit at once, but over a period of time to fill orders. In the cases of some issues, such as silver dollars, where the number sold is several thousand coins less, it is likely that the total number made never reached the mintage limit.

The actual mintage is the number sold, while the other number is the mintage limit. These numbers are published in the annual reports and then picked up by Charlton for its coin catalogues. *Canadian Coin News* publishes updated numbers each year as part of our coverage of the Mint's annual report.

As for the certificate numbers, they do not represent x of y in most cases, but are tracking numbers.

Clear as mud?



This 1951 five-cent coin seems to have experienced some sort of trauma after it left the Mint.

Q. While going through many rolls of Canada 1951 commemorative nickels I came across this one with four punches to the obverse. Two are directly to the king's portrait and the other two are on the rim. If this is a die error, what is it referred to as and how does it occur?

A. These do not appear to be die errors, but rather something that happened after the coins left the Mint. Exactly what will probably remain a mystery.

Q. I have found this loonie in pocket change. It looked a bit different after closer examination. It has some other imprint. I'm wondering what it could be.

A. At first glance it appears to be some form of plating error.

The strange imprints on this 2006 loonie are likely the result of a plating error.

The Rebellions of 1837 in Upper and Lower Canada had far-reaching economic and political implications. The *Report on the Affairs of British North America* – more commonly known as the Durham Report, after its author, British Whig politician John George Lambton, 1st Earl of Durham – suggested causes of the rebellions and prescribed remedies, eventually resulting in the Union Act that merged Upper and Lower Canada into the Province of Canada in 1841. Lower Canada (now Quebec) would be referred to as Canada East and Upper Canada (now Ontario) would be referred to as Canada West.

The mid-19th century was a period of economic milestones in Canada East. While the early 19th century was a time of canal building, the 1850s were considered the era of railway building. These years also saw a large export of squared timber from Canada East for shipbuilding in England stimulated by the Crimean War. Prosperity also received a boost from reciprocity with the United States in 1855.

How to compensate persons who suffered property losses or damage during the rebellions had not been resolved and continued to be a lingering political sore. The primary dispute was whether persons who had been convicted of treason during the rebellions and been transported to Bermuda should be reimbursed, rather than indemnifying only loyal subjects. During 1849, the debate raged in the Province of Canada parliament in Montreal.

Some insurgents had been granted special pardons allowing leading patriots to return to Canada, although this did not include William Lyon Mackenzie. The leader of the rebellion in Upper Canada had exiled himself to the United States, but the passage of the Amnesty Bill by the parliament of the Province of Canada in February 1849 allowed for his return.

Soon after hostilities ended, legislation in Lower Canada al-

lowed reparations only for loyalists who had suffered financial loss. This neglected to acknowledge the considerable destruction of property by those in authority and was rectified by the parliament of the Province of Canada when the Rebellion Losses Bill passed the elected assembly on March 9, 1849 and the appointed legislative council on March 15, 1849. This would allow for compensation for loss regardless of whether a person was considered a loyalist or a rebel.

When the bill received royal assent on April 25, 1849 in Montreal, governor general James Bruce and his entourage were pelted with eggs and other projectiles. A crowd gathered at the Champ de Mars and after a series of rousing and provocative speeches opposed to the Rebellion Losses Bill, the crowd made its way to the Parliament House where the assembly was sitting. Windows were smashed and the mob entered the building, including the assembly chamber, where furniture was destroyed and the mace was confiscated and brought to the Donegani Hotel and presented to Tory Allan MacNab. The rioters set the Parliament on fire and only 1,000 of 20,000 volumes in the assembly library were preserved. The smaller library in the executive council chamber was completely destroyed. All public records of both upper and lower parliaments were destroyed as well as those of the provincial parliament since the union.

Ironically, the Rebellion Losses Bill, the cause of the riot survived. Troops did not arrive in time to stop the hooligans, who took control of the fire engines that did arrive, rendering them useless. The Parliament House was completely destroyed.

Private homes including that of Louis Lafontaine, a supporter of the bill, were also targeted and set afire. The governor general and members of the assembly were met with more hostility and violence when travelling to Government House on April 30. Sub-

sequent political discussion called for somewhat radical reforms, including annexation of Canada to the U.S., a federal union of the British North American colonies and independence of the BNA colonies from Britain.

Due to the riots and burning of Parliament, the seat of government was removed from Montreal and rotated between Quebec City and Toronto until Confederation, when it was shifted to Ottawa.

Fifteen years had passed since the Quebec Bank partnered with the Bank of Montreal, City Bank and the Banque du Peuple to issue the popular Habitant tokens. The Quebec Bank, one of the earliest in Canada, was established as a private partnership in October 1818. It obtained a charter in 1822 from the Province of Lower Canada and a royal charter in May 1837. After the government seat relocated to Quebec City, the Quebec Bank would receive government deposits, creating a need to issue further tokens.

One-penny and halfpenny copper tokens (Breton Nos. 528, 529) were struck by Ralph Heaton Mint in Birmingham, England. The obverse features a Habitant in traditional dress with the inscription "PROVINCE DU CANADA" around the top of the rim and the denomination of either "DEUX SOUS" or "UN SOU" around the bottom.

The reverse, very artistic in nature, illustrates the arms of Quebec, which includes a seated Britannia facing right with her left arm extended. Her right arm rests on a shield while she holds a cornucopia (horn of plenty) in the other. The shield portrays a lion walking to the left while a beaver is situated in front of Britannia and a beehive behind. The St. Lawrence River appears in the distance to the right with a vessel at anchor, while the Cita-

del of Quebec can be seen at the left. The words "QUEBEC BANK TOKEN" are around the top of the rim, the date of 1852 is shown below the figure and either "HALF PENNY" or "ONE PENNY" is situated below the date.

Numismatist Sheldon Carroll uncovered a startling revelation in his article entitled, "The old Masters can be wrong," found in the January 1956 edition of the *Canadian Numismatic Journal*, the official publication of the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association. Carroll examined the 1852 Quebec Bank tokens using drawings found in late 19th-century books authored by Joseph Leroux and Pierre Breton. On the reverse of the actual tokens, Britannia's outstretched hand points towards the ship. While Leroux and Breton have this drawing correct on the halfpenny, their one-penny drawings show Britannia with her left hand by her side.

The 1852 Quebec Bank tokens, along with the Bank of Upper Canada tokens, would help pro-

vide the Province of Canada with small change until the decimal issues of 1858 and 1859. As for the Quebec Bank, it merged with the Royal Bank in 1917, although its legacy continues to be remembered through its tokens. 🍁

A slight improvement continues in the Canadian paper money market and the bottom seems to have been hit some months ago, as both buyers and higher prices are returning. Higher prices are evident again in the more common earlier notes and in rarities.

Dominion, 1935, 1937 and 1954 Devil's Face issues up to EF are generally getting firmer prices, reflecting the entry or return of average collectors who were seen less often since 2008. There is stronger demand for lower-value notes that often begin collections. This is a good sign for the future, but it is still a soft market.

Rare notes, whether chartered or Bank of Canada, still command top dollar. Despite fewer high-end collectors, there are even fewer high-end notes, so that segment is strong. There are exceptions, so it is unwise to assume any rarity will fetch top dollar. If the key collectors have a note being offered, then it can go unsold or sell at a modest price.

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Museums serving as reminders of the Holocaust are found in many parts of the western world, but there is just one, Yad Vashem in Jerusalem, to which they are all compared. It is the pioneer of Holocaust museums worldwide, and one that since its inception in 1953, has dedicated itself to recovering the names and identities of every Jewish person murdered in the Holocaust. Yad Vashem is the Jewish people's living memorial to the Holocaust, visited by nearly one million people annually.

A just-issued legal tender coin marking Yad Vashem's 60th anniversary has been designed by Yossi Lemel, and depicts a simple striped shirt with the yellow Star of David that the Nazis forced Jews to wear. Dominating a blank field behind the shirt is a bolder and larger Star of David rising in the background that is a statement of "Am Yisroel Chai" (the people of Israel live). The other side bears Israel's state emblem, "Israel" in English, Hebrew and Arabic, the date and mint mark.

The Yad Vashem coin, which also serves as Israel's 65th-anniversary coin, is available in gold, with a diameter of 30 mm and a mintage of 555; and two silver coins, a two-new sheqalim coin measuring 38.7 mm with a mintage of 2,800 coins, and a 30-mm new sheqalim in Proof-Like condition, limited to 1,800 coins.

Part of the proceeds from the sales of the coins is being donated by Israel Coins and Medals to Yad Vashem.

BACK ISSUES

A look back at numismatic history through CCN's 50 years of archives

50 YEARS AGO

A 36-year-old Buffalo, N.Y. coin dealer was charged with trying to smuggle \$14,000 worth of gold coins out of Canada.

More than 100 dealers were participating in the American Numismatic Exchange. The system which allowed dealers to buy and sell over a wire service, hit a daily volume of \$500,000.

Maple Creek, Sask. issued a 50-cent token commemorating the community's 50th anniversary.

40 YEARS AGO

Louise Graham was elected as the first-ever woman head of the Canadian Numismatic Association at the group's annual convention, held in Saskatoon.

Indiana State University announced that it would be offering a non-credit course on numismatics.

An historian claimed that the first coins were made not in Asia Minor, but in China.

30 YEARS AGO

Norman Williams received the J. Douglas Ferguson Award, the highest honour of the Canadian Numismatic Association.

The British Royal Mint announced that there would be four different variants of the one-pound coin. The different versions would honour England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland, with floral emblems of oak, thistle, leek and flax.

Unitrade Press published a new book on Canadian military badges of the Second World War.

J.A. Moisan, a Quebec grocer, was issuing trade notes honouring the 375th anniversary of Quebec.

20 YEARS AGO

Canada's new \$200 gold coin, designed by Stewart Sherwood, featured an image of a Mountie and his horse, along with some children.

Maurice LaFontaine, Royal Canadian Mint master, announced his retirement. His replacement, Ruth Hubbard, was the first woman to serve as RCM master. Hubbard was previously a deputy minister in the Ministry of Supply and Services.

To restore order to its failing economy, the government of Russia announced plans to demonetize the 1993 series of ruble banknotes, which had demonetized all earlier issues. In an effort to stabilize the economy, citizens would only be allowed to convert a small portion of their holdings, the rest having to be put on deposit for six months.

10 YEARS AGO

The first gold kilo coins ever struck by the British Royal Mint were sold out within an hour and twenty minutes of issuance. Twenty-one Alderney 22-karat gold coins marking Prince William's 21st birthday were struck with a denomination of 1,000 pounds, the highest face value seen to date on a U.K. coin.

For the first time to date, a certified AU50 example of the 1870-CC Double Eagle was set to hit the auction block. Certified by NGC, the coin was one of only about five known to exist in that grading level, and was expected to realize between \$200,000 and \$250,000 US.

Several countries and mints were issuing commemorative coins leading up to the 2004 Summer Olympics in Athens, including the Isle of Man, Sierra Leone and the British Virgin Islands. Most issues were designed with an historical nod to the city's claim to fame as the original home of the modern Olympic Games.

While they likely don't sound familiar to our everyday lives, the names of prehistoric creatures land on Julius Csotonyi's desk on a regular basis.

As one of only a handful of "paleoartists" living in Canada, Csotonyi has made a career of creating colourful interpretations of the creatures that inhabited Earth millions of years ago.

While he is educated as a scientist – he recently completed PhD studies in microbiology at the University of Winnipeg – he has been able to turn his childhood love of doodling dinosaurs into a full-time career.

"I use my scientific background, and I like to think of what I do as halfway in between, because I mainly work with scientists in reconstructing images of these animals."

When a new species or site is discovered, the paleontologists contact Csotonyi, and a conversation of words and images begins in cyberspace.

From his home studio in Edmonton, the artist creates sketches, based on the descriptions he receives.

"They will tell me all the basics of the actual discovery, send photos and relevant materials, or manuscripts to read to describe what they are publishing," he says. "The corre-

spondence will say what it is they want to highlight about the animal, a new kind of skull shape for example, so they say they want that in the foreground.

"I'll send a sketch and then we go back and forth revising to make sure it is anatomically correct, and represents what the scientists are seeing."

The fully finished illustrations are then used in scientific journal articles, on posters or in conference presentations, as well as in the inevitable press kits that go along with publishing.

In other words, those involved in this scientific field around the world, and those with an interest in Earth's prehistoric history, have likely seen the natural history illustrator's work in the past few years.

In the more recent past, he has had the privilege of sharing his creations with a much wider audience, as one of the artists of choice to design prehistoric creatures for Royal Canadian Mint commemoratives.

"I was invited to participate in a competition, and I'm honoured to be chosen. This is quite an amazing opportunity to contribute to culture in Canada," Csotonyi notes.

Four coins have been released in the past two years alone bearing his designs, including the first three of the widely popular glow-in-the-dark series. The glowing

coloured coins feature two different layers, one with the coloured representation one would see during the daylight, and the other a skeletal representation that becomes visible once the lights are turned off.

The latest to bear his initials is the third in the glow-in-the-dark series; a 25-cent coin featuring *Tylosaurus peminensis*, a super-predator related to present-day snakes and Komodo dragons that – at 13 metres in length – is believed to have been one of the most massive creatures to ever inhabit Earth's oceans. The past two releases in the series, both of which sold out with mintages of 25,000 and 30,000, feature depictions of *Pachyrhinosaurus lakustai* (2012), a newer species found at one of the lesser-known sites, in Grande Prairie, Alta., and *Quetzalcoatlus* (2013), one of the largest animals ever to take to the air.

All of his coin designs are hailed as interpretations of prehistoric creatures (dinosaur refers only to those who were terrestrial, either living on land or flying in the air, he notes), and have the official blessing of Alberta's Royal Tyrell Museum, Canada's only museum dedicated exclusively to the study of paleontology, or the study of prehistoric plants and animals through fossil records.

Csotonyi is self-taught in his art, having honed his skills from a very early age. He has also gained enough experience in the digital world to feel comfortable working on natural history illustrations without the traditional tools of pencil and paper.

"Years ago I would have sketched things out with a pencil, but now it is all done with a stylus and tablet, so that the image is immediately transferred into a digital format.

"That is better when I am sending sketches for approval, if things need to be changed, before I work on the multiple layers, such as the skeletal glowing layer for the coins. I can offer more options this way, quickly, before the final image is selected and refined."

At the same time, Csotonyi confesses that he has gone back to traditional methods for his commercial artwork; the work outside of science.

"There is always a pleasant feel in being able to work with a real pencil or paint. I've used watercolours in the past, but am working more with acrylics, a little bit of oils and pastels as well."

While the diversity of species still being discovered keeps the work interesting, Csotonyi confesses that the

meat-eating, two-legged varieties, known as theropods, would have to be his favourites.

He is currently working on the last stages of a book, tentatively titled *The Paleoart of Julius Csotonyi*, which is being edited by Steve White, and should be released sometime next year.

The gold version has a face value of \$2,500 and mintage of 18; the silver version has a face value of \$250, and mintage of 388. Both have a purity of .9999.

A second gold and silver pair are designed by Aries Cheng.

The fifth design in a series of 12, the coins show a galloping horse, the symbol for horse, and the whimsical elements that are part of Cheng's style.

The silver coin has a weight of 31.39 grams, diameter of 38 mm, purity of .9999, and mintage limit of 28,888. The gold coin has a weight of 11.84 grams, diameter of 28 mm, and purity of .75, or 18-karat, with the balance in silver. The mintage limit is 2,500.

Three Degrees also designed the fifth coin in the lotus series of scallop-edge coins.

The .9999 silver coin is struck in Proof, with a matte image of horse on a mirror background. The coin has a diameter of 38 mm, weight of 26.7 grams, purity of .9999, and mintage limit of 28,888.

The final coin is designed by Simon Ng and shows a stylized profile of a horse.

The .9999 coins are struck in Specimen finish, not often used for non-circulating legal tender, with a mintage limit of 58,888. The coins weigh 15.87 grams and have a diameter of 34 mm.

The Year of the Horse will start in 2014, with the exact day determined by the moon. It will run from Jan. 31, 2014 to Feb. 28, 2015.

The lunar zodiac is a 60-year cycle combining 12 animals, with five elements. According to legend, the horse is a symbol of nobility, class, speed, and perseverance. People born in the Year of the Horse are smart, practical, but sometimes impatient.

Earlier years of the horse have been 1942, 1954, 1966, 1978, 1990, and 2002. Famous Horses include James Dean, Clint Eastwood, Ella Fitzgerald, Harrison Ford, Janet Jackson, Teddy Roosevelt, Davy Crockett, Sean Connery, Halle Berry, and Adam Sandler. 🍁

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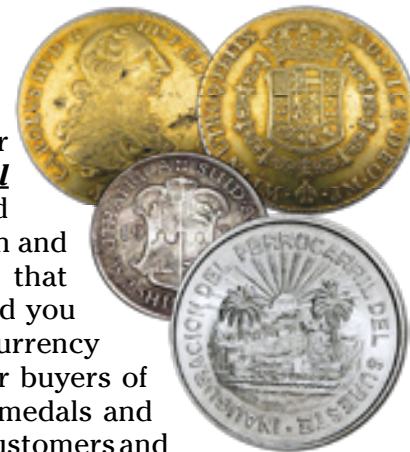
