Seven-figure private sale sees acclaimed currency collectors part with Canadian collection

Described as “the most complete and most valuable collection of Canadian banknotes ever assembled,” the Dauer Collection was recently sold to an international collector for an undisclosed seven-figure amount.

Mike Abramson, of Minnesota’s Executive Currency, brokered the private sale of

Joanne and Edward Dauer’s Canadian currency collection this fall.

“This was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to obtain the only complete collection of issued banknotes for my client,” said Abramson, who added it “may be many generations before these notes may again appear on the market, if ever.”

Described by Abramson as “the only complete privately held collection of Bank of Canada and Dominion of Canada banknotes by design,” the collection included the only 1911 \$1,000 note in private hands. It was also “nearly complete by Charlton number” and included the only known privately held 1912 \$5 Series C note, complete with the McCavour-Saunders signature combination (DC-21h). Other highlights include the rare 1866 \$2 and \$5 notes issued by the Province of Canada.

All notes were authenticated and graded by Paper Money Guaranty (PMG).

“The superb quality of the notes was also an important

1874 Governor General’s medal returned to Ontario school

Awarded in 1874 to a student at the Ontario Institution for the Education of the Deaf and Dumb, a bronze Governor General’s academic medal was recently returned to the school’s collection.

Originally presented to William W. Smith, a student of the Belleville, Ont. school, the medal was awarded for “the best workmanship in the Mechanical Department” according to the 1875 *Annual*

Report of the Inspector of Asylums, Prisons, and Public Charities.

“As the general result of my examinations, I have pleasure in reporting that the most

Desmond portrait on new \$10 continues ‘creep toward centre’

The placement of the portrait on the latest Canadian banknote has broken with a tradition dating back to the Bank of Canada’s first issue, the aptly named 1935 Series, which was released more than eight decades ago.



The portrait on the new vertically oriented \$10 note – the first banknote of the as-of-yet unnamed eighth Bank of Canada Series – is in the centre, where it could be disfigured by folding.

“The new vertical \$10 banknote was designed with largely the same technical layout as the past series of polymer notes to minimize the impact on the cash-processing industry,” said Amélie Ferron-Craig, media relations consultant with the Bank of Canada.

These design features include a large window at the bottom depicting the Library of Parliament’s vaulted dome ceiling; a large “10” numeral at the top; and a tactile feature for Canadians who are

blind or partially sighted. These features “are all essentially in the same position as they were on the Frontiers series,” Ferron-Craig added.

“With these technical requirements, the portrait had to be placed in the centre of the bank note. It was nevertheless placed in a position where a centre fold would have as minimal an impact as possible.”

‘GENERALLY AVOIDED’

In the recent past – as recently as the soon-to-be withdrawn Frontiers series – the Bank of Canada “generally avoided placing the portrait in a position where a fold down the middle would end up in the centre of the portrait,” Ferron-Craig said.

“You will notice that in the Frontiers series polymer notes, for example, portraits are slightly offset towards the left side of the note.”

If folded directly down the centre, the new \$10 note featuring Viola Desmond would cross her upper lip and nose.

The legend of Jerry Remick

In this edition of *CCN*, you'll note my regular column, "Numismatic Fringe," has reached a milestone.

This is column #50, which, in many respects, is quite the accomplishment. While writing the column, I was researching legendary Quebec numismatist Jerome "Jerry" Remick, who from 1978-2004 churned out the popular "Trade Dollar News" column every other week.

Jerry began collecting stamps when he was a kid. Around 1940, after an aunt gave him a Newfoundland coin, he became hooked. His interest in numismatics, however, went far beyond coins alone as Jerry evolved into a true student of numismatics.

Jerry was a founding member of the Canadian Numismatic Association (now the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association) in 1950.

A decade later, he was a driving force behind the formation of the Quebec Numismatic Society (Société Numismatique de Québec, or SNQ).

He also founded the Association of Personalized Medal Issuers (APMI) and had nearly 200 personalized medals struck for himself.

I remember the first time I "met" Jerry in 1990, just after I wrote my first catalogue, *Ontario Municipal and Commemorative Medals*. He was first off the mark to send me a letter of congratulations and offered to write a review of the book for his "Trade Dollar News" column.

How could I refuse?

After that, Jerry and I corresponded often. We met at various RCNA and On-

tario Numismatic Association conventions and maintained our friendship until his passing in March 2005. I rather miss his typed letters (he only used a manual typewriter), which had several keys that stuck and fell (I remember the "y") so Jerry would cross it out and write over it in ink. He did this with any spelling mistakes he made while typing. I don't think he ever discovered white-out, and he certainly never operated a computer or even a "CorreType."



Jerry was old school all the way. He was a gentle, soft-spoken fellow with a prominent-yet-slight French accent that was quite endearing. As noted, he refused to use anything but his manual typewriter, which I am told he carted with him into the bush as he worked at remote sites practicing his geological craft. And what a kind soul he was. I don't think I ever heard him say an unkind word about anyone or anyone say anything unkind about him. He was generous and compassionate and a man of his word. If he promised to deliver a

Armistice toonie error discovered

One of the Royal Canadian Mint's newly issued \$2 circulation coins was recently found with what one collector is calling a "major error."

The non-colourized coin – one of the one million unpainted versions issued beginning Oct. 15 – marks the 100th anniversary of the First World War armistice. On the reverse, most of the outer ring's design, including the two poppies at the top left and right as well as "REMEMBER / 2018 / SOUVENIR" at the bottom, are missing. The helmet at the top of the inner ring, as well as the "A" and "E" from the word "ARMISTICE," are also poorly stuck.

"I was shocked. I just looked at it and

thought, 'What the heck is this?'" said the collector who discovered the coin. "I think it's a major error coin."

An active coin club member in Ontario, he wishes to remain anonymous.

"I found it in a roll from the Mint about a week after the coins came out," he said, adding he purchased three

column or a single article, he always did.

Jerry was one special man for sure. In the numismatic world, he was probably best known for his extensive numismatic writing and cataloguing. He was one of the first people to inventory and list the coins of the British Commonwealth, and he authored or co-authored many books. These include:

- *The Coinage and Banknotes of Ireland 1928-1968;*
- *The Complete Hong Kong Coin Catalogue 1863-1965;*
- *The Complete Rhodesia Coin Catalogue 1932-1963;*
- *The Coinage of the Dominican Republic (with Alcedo Almolzar);* and
- *The Coinage of Jamaica (with Ray Byrne).*

There were many other books, thousands of articles and numerous awards, including the coveted J. Douglas Ferguson Award – the RCNA's highest distinction.

A philanthropist, Jerry established the Jerome H. Remick III Endowment Trust Fund for the Canadian Geological Foundation and donated nearly \$500,000 to the fund.

I could go on all day as I have only touched the tip of the iceberg, but back to my initial reason for writing this article.

True, I wanted to mention Numismatic Fringe reaching

the 50-column mark, but next to Jerry's "Trade Dollar News," which saw more than 600 columns published during its run, this 50 number is but a mere reminder of the huge footsteps I have to fill in tackling Numismatic Fringe.

Those footprints were made by a numismatic giant, who for more than half a century mentored and encouraged numerous young collectors – like me – to reach for greater things and contribute to the hobby in whatever way they found possible.

Here's to you, Jerry! 🍁

Q3 2018 PROFITS REPORTED BY RCM

The Royal Canadian Mint reported a profit "before income tax and other items" of \$10.5 million for the third quarter of 2018 – down slightly from the same period last year – while the profit margin remained consistent at three per cent quarter over quarter. As expected, sales of numismatic products continued on a downward trend in the third quarter, decreasing to \$24.5 million (compared to \$43.4 million last year) after a strong year in 2017 driven by Canada 150 product sales. In particular, sales of silver and base metal numismatic products are down 47 per cent quarter over quarter. "The Mint continues to achieve steady profitability despite factors challenging some of our businesses," said Jennifer Camelon, interim president and CEO of the Mint. "Through sound cost controls, new contracts in refinery and bullion storage services, as well as increased foreign circulation revenue, the Mint is performing well after three quarters and is poised for a strong finish to 2018." Gold bullion volumes increased to 156,000 ounces (compared to 135,000 ounces last year) while silver bullion volumes were 4.7 million ounces (compared to five million last year). Bullion ancillary services revenue doubled quarter over quarter as these services continue to expand, which "continues to allow us to effectively manage the overall costs of the Bullion business during the current market conditions," according to a statement issued by the Mint this December. The shipment of 346 million foreign coins and blanks in the quarter (compared to 296 million in 2017) combined with higher revenue per coin resulted in an increase in revenue from the Mint's foreign circulation business as compared to the third quarter of 2017. Canadian circulation coin production was 304 million pieces in the quarter (compared to 421 million pieces in 2017). To read more of the Mint's third-quarter report, visit mint.ca.

ROMA GANG MEMBER ARRESTED IN NYC

The Numismatic Crime Information Center (NCIC), together with international law enforcement partners in the U.S. and U.K., have been tracking Roma gang members targeting coin shops. In the past three months, the NCIC issued various email alerts with photographs of suspects alleged to be using distractions and quick change thefts when trying to purchase coins. On Nov. 29, officers with the New York Police Depart-

ment (NYPD) arrested one of the main suspects, Ioan Bulauca. Three other subjects were also detained but not arrested. The group was "highly mobile nationwide," according to an NCIC statement, and several thefts were thwarted by dealers who received the email alerts and shared this information with employees and other dealers. Bulauca is currently in custody of the NYPD. This spring, at least half a dozen dealers across most of Canada were hit by about a dozen different people believed to be part of a larger criminal or-



ganization. Canadian Association of Numismatic Dealers (CAND) President Michael Findlay described the various thefts of high-value gold coins as "almost like a mafia situation." Upwards of eight ounces of gold were stolen from each of the locations using distraction tactics and sleight of hand. Don Cardwell, director of loss prevention with Jewellers Vigilance of Canada (JVC), said two of the suspects were from Romania and added the federal government lifted Visa restrictions for Romanians as well as Bulgarians in December 2017. "This has caused a major influx of Romani thieves from their country," he said, adding the JVC's "jewellery thefts to date equal our reported losses from 2017 combined." HAMILTON COIN CLUB TO HOLD FIRST MEETING

For the first time in about three decades, a coin club is planning to meet in Hamilton, Ont. Organizers Robb McPherson, Alan Roy and Len Trakalo – all members of the Ontario Numismatic Association – co-ordinated the

feasibility of a re-invented Hamilton Coin Club, whose inaugural meeting is slated for Jan. 7, 2019, at St. Michael's Anglican Church on 1188 Fennell Ave. E. Anyone interested in coins, medals, tokens, paper money or other numismatic material are invited to attend. The doors will open to the public at 6:30 p.m. Hamilton is "a city whose collectors have had to branch out to other clubs outside its boundaries," said McPherson. "It has been my goal for a few years now to get something started again in the 'Steel City.'" The geographic centre of the Golden Horseshoe, the Greater City of Hamilton includes not only Hamilton but also Stoney Creek, Ancaster, Flamborough, Dundas and Glanbrook. Altogether, its population exceeds 720,000. Organizers chose the first Monday of the new year to avoid any conflict with other club meetings with a two-hour distance and are expecting a large turnout. MEMBER REFERRAL INCENTIVE OFFERED BY WCS

The Waterloo Coin Society (WCS), whose membership is comprised of collectors from Waterloo as well as other parts of Ontario, is offering a member referral incentive. "Efforts to entice new members with a promotional discount incentive at our mall days and annual shows in addition to advertising have been quite successful over the past few years helping to ensure our stability," reads the WCS newsletter for December 2018. "At a recent executive meeting, one of the discussion items was how members could be encouraged to become more involved on a personal level in the recruitment process." The WCS executive approved a referral incentive that will see new members referred to the club by existing members receive an instant discount of \$5 (\$3 for juniors) for their first year's dues. The WCS will also issue the existing member a card redeemable for \$5 off their membership renewal. "Let's say you manage to convince a few collector friends and some neighbourhood kids to sign up. If the total value of the cards collected exceeds your annual dues amount, the remainder may be applied to a future year's renewals provided you have done so prior to the expiry date on the cards." Immediate family members are ineligible for the referral bonus, and other restrictions may apply.

Extensive coinage relates to Alexander III



Ancient MONEY

By Stanley Clute

Alexander III (called the Great) died suddenly in 323 BC, leaving behind a huge empire.

He was nominally succeeded by an infant son we call Alexander IV and an older half-brother Arrhidaeus. Like Alexander the Great, Arrhidaeus was a son of Philip II of Macedon but by a different mother, Philinna of Larissa. When he succeeded Alexander, he assumed the name Philip and is known to history as Philip III Arrhidaeus.

Neither Alexander IV nor Philip III Arrhidaeus held any real power as that was controlled by the generals of Alexander the Great. They soon started to squabble amongst themselves and eventually carved up Alexander's huge domain. Alexander IV and his mother were assassinated when the young king was but 14 years old in 309 BC.

Some coins were issued in the name of Philip III Arrhidaeus of Macedon, though nowhere near the volume issued by Alexander the Great. There are numerous varieties, so I will just cite a few.

The coins include a gold stater with an obverse showing a head of the goddess Athena

facing right and wearing a Corinthian helmet. The reverse shows a full length figure of Nike (Victory) standing facing left and a Greek inscription identifying the issuer as Philip the King.

Silver tetradrachms (four-drachm pieces) were issued similar in design to those of Alexander the Great, having an obverse design of a youthful, beardless head of Herakles wearing the skin of the Nemean lion. The reverse features the familiar type of Zeus seated facing left on a throne and holding an eagle and a sceptre; however the inscription on the reverse identifies the coin as having been issued by Philip.

As with Alexander, there are also silver drachms of a design similar to the tetradrachms. Philip III was murdered at the instigation of Olympias, the mother of Alexander the Great, in 317 BC after a reign of only six years.

PTOLEMIES & SELEUCIDS

Out of the wars of Alexander the Great's successors, the Diadochi, two large kingdoms emerged and greatly impacted history. These were the king-

doms of the Ptolemies and the Seleucids.

Ptolemy I, nicknamed Soter (Saviour) held the title of satrap or governor of Egypt. In that capacity, he struck silver tetradrachms depicting the head of Alexander the Great wearing an elephant skin on their obverses and Athena advancing right with a spear and a shield on the reverses along with the names of both Alexander and Ptolemy. He also issued smaller silver and some bronze coins.

In 305 BC, Ptolemy assumed the title of king, and this move is reflected on his coins. Ptolemy's own head now appeared on his gold and silver coins. On the reverse, an eagle is standing facing left – a type that would be copied over and over again with variations by his successors. The inscription referred to Ptolemy and gave his title as king.

As such, he also issued bronze coins with various designs.

In 285 BC, Ptolemy made his son Ptolemy II his co-ruler, and in 283, he died peacefully of natural causes.

The general Seleucus, later known as Seleucus I Nicator (i.e. the Victor), was given the governorship of Babylon in 321 BC, but it was wrested from him in 316 by another general Antigonos the One-Eyed. He fled to Ptolemy in Egypt.

In 312, he recaptured Babylon. Seleucus eventually acquired nearly all of Alexander's conquests except Egypt.

In 305, he declared himself king. The size of the Seleucid domain varied with time but was at its greatest extent during the reigns of Seleucus I and his son Antiochus I.

Seleucus' coins included gold distaters (two-stater coins) with the head of Athena on their obverses and a figure of Nike on their reverses. Another issue of staters features a head of Apollo on its obverse and a figure of

the goddess Artemis in a chariot being drawn by two horned elephants on the reverse.

Seleucus struck a variety of silver tetradrachms including some that resemble those of Alexander the Great: a youthful head of Herakles on the obverse and the god Zeus seated on a throne on the reverse, but their inscriptions identify these coins as having been minted by Seleucus.

Another tetradrachm of this ruler shows a head of Alexander with rather elaborate head gear on the obverse and Nike crowning a trophy on the reverse.



A silver drachm issued for Lysimachus also depicts a young head of Heracles wearing a lion skin and Zeus holding an eagle.

Yet another coin's obverse represents the head of Zeus facing right while the reverse depicts Athena in a chariot being drawn by four horned elephants.

During his reign, Seleucus also struck issues of smaller silver coins, including drachms, hemidrachms and bronze coins – far too many to discuss in the space available here.

I should mention another of Alexander's successors, Lysimachus, who gained control of Thrace. Like Ptolemy and Seleucus, he declared himself king in 305 BC. Following the death of Antigonos the One-Eyed four years later, Lysimachus expanded his kingdom to include Macedon and a considerable portion of Asia Minor.

The many coin types issued by Lysimachus include a silver tetradrachm and a drachm, both of which depict a young head of Heracles wearing a lion skin. In addition, there are coins showing the head of Alexander the Great on their obverses. There are many obverse types and many reverses. His coins are well worth study.

In 281 BC, Seleucus defeated Lysimachus at the Battle of Corupedium. This brought an end to the period of the Diadochi. With the death of Lysimachus, his Asian and Anatolian

lands were absorbed by Seleucus.

To commemorate his victory, Seleucus struck a special silver tetradrachm from a mint at Pergamum. It depicts a horned horse head in a bridle on the obverse and an elephant walking to right plus an identifying inscription in the field on the reverse.

Seleucus especially coveted Lysimachus' European territories of Thrace and Macedon, but upon arriving in Tharce in 281 or 280 BC, he was murdered by a son of his former ally Ptolemy I, Ptolemy Ceraunus, to whom he had given refuge.

Ptolemy Ceraunus went on to assume the kingship of Macedon, dying in 279 BC in the wars against the Gauls. 🍁

Sudbury show offers good variety for attendees

For the past three years, the Nickel Belt Coin Club has hosted the Nickel Belt Coin Club Coin and Stamp Show at Sudbury's Dynamic Earth, home of the Big Nickel Monument.

The venue is one of the most unique spaces for a coin or stamp show anywhere in Canada. As you walk toward the building, the more than four-metre five-cent coin towers over you to the left.

Upon entering the building, you realize this is no ordinary coin and stamp show.

Attending this show allows you to walk by interesting exhibits about Canada's geology as you meander through the hallways and rooms interspersed with exhibits as well as coin and stamp dealers.

Upon entering the main entryway, you pass by the admission table and then to the "Road Show" table, where coins, stamps and currency can be evaluated and questions asked by the curious public. This is a nice feature as it takes some of the pressure off the dealers and allows the public more time to get a more in-depth answer to their questions.

As you continue through the hallway, there are tables with numismatic and philatelic literature followed by a room dedicated to stamp dealers.

Continuing on, the Sudbury Stamp Club and Northern Ontario Relic and Treasure Hunters (NORTH) have information ta-

bles set up among other non-competitive exhibits relating to foreign currency, the Mond Company 25th-anniversary medal and a special kids activity area.

Another interesting exhibit relating to counterfeit coins and currency was displayed compliments of the Greater Sudbury Police.

Asked how the fight against counterfeiting is going in the Greater Sudbury area, Constable Chantal St. Martin explained that although the new polymer notes appear to have confounded counterfeiters, "we are seeing a lot of counterfeit U.S. currency because the people in this area are not as familiar with it. That's one of the reasons I'm here today and why I am distributing literature about what the public should be looking for when handling U.S. currency."

RELICS & TREASURES

NORTH's table was very interesting and featured artifacts, such as coins and jewelry, unearthed by the group.

Both Richard Jacobs and Ian McPhee, who were staffing the table, have many years of combined experience in the hobby.

NORTH is a group of people who, as a hobby, use an electronic device called a metal detector to locate metallic items buried in the ground.

In 1982, a number of people formed a club with a common interest in promoting the hobby

and sharing their experiences with others. The members are collectors of various items, though the majority collect coins, bottles, rocks, military items, openers, stamps, postcards and other paper collectibles.

The club's aim, according to Jacobs, is "to educate members of the public who own detectors, on the extensive uses of their machines, the proper tuning and handling of them and of particular mention, the methods of re-

"The club has monthly meetings featuring guest speakers on various aspects relating to their hobbies such as prospecting, ghost towns, coins and coin cleaning, evaluating and dating old collectable bottles, how to turn ordinary rocks into gemstones, the proper use and tuning of metal detectors and related equipment and so forth," said Jacobs.

"We show films, slides and other media on subjects pertaining to our interests, as well as conduct other club business in an orderly fashion as required."

Jacob's explained "outside our clubroom," NORTH hosts organized weekend hunts, day outings and excursions by individuals or groups.

"As a public service, we will search in an orderly manner for any lost valuables, be it jewelry, coins, or even lost keys. This we will do at no cost to the individual. We take an oath to remove junk items from areas we hunt, such as parks, schools and beaches."

covery which, through association with other clubs, have been refined to give the maximum results, leaving no visible traces of damage to search areas."

"Poor recovery methods have, in the past, given the hobby a poor following with those in official appointments and nearly caused the demise of the hobby. Formation of clubs, whose aim is proper instruction and recovery, has reversed these feelings to the point where we now have good

relations with park attendants and school officials. We can once again freely enjoy the hobby of metal detecting and its many rewards."

KIDS' TABLE, ACTIVITIES

Another popular area at the Sudbury show was the kids' activities tables, of which there were several.

The kids were able to work on various fun coin-related activities while being surrounded by the Dynamic Earth geological displays and the Nickel Belt Coin Club show displays.

According to past president Keith Godin, the club is considering hosting a kids' auction at next year's show.

"That's a possibility," said Godin, who is looking into the logistics of hosting such an event.

At the end of the meandering path at Dynamic Earth laid a final room reserved for the coin dealers. Interestingly, due to the stimulating path attendees are encouraged to follow to reach the room, there was no issue with getting everyone to check it out.

All areas seemed to be equally busy, which is sometimes an issue at shows with more than two bourse areas set up for dealers.

Dynamic Earth and the Nickel Belt Coin Club have had a great relationship for several years now, and hopefully, the partnership can continue so the uniqueness of this coin and stamp show remains intact. 🍁

New full colour catalogue on die varieties



Errors & VARIETIES

After working on the photographs, writing and layout for a few years, Christian Houle recently self-published his *Guide to Errors and Varieties on Canadian Coins*, which is now available directly from the author.

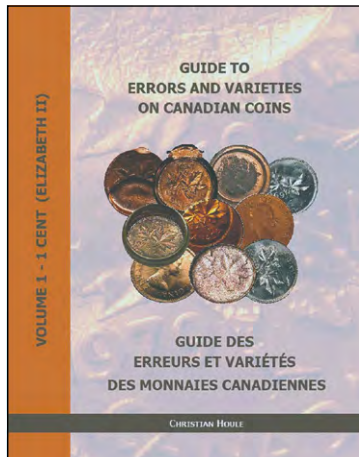


Illustration 1. Author Christian Houle's new 284-page book is fully bilingual with all 1,800 illustrations in full colour.

The book features errors and varieties of one-cent coins during the reign of Queen Elizabeth II. The nearly 1,800 excellent photos are printed 12 to a page and are large enough so readers can see even the smallest die breaks – and they are all in full colour.

Some 1,500 listings for 60 dates (1953-2012) are included in 284 pages. When you consider the catalogue only covers the one-cent issues for that period, this is quite a feat in research, photography and layout.

As I stated in my own book that dealt mainly with errors, the best way of explaining something is to show a photo. That is especially important when you are cataloguing the specific location and subtle differences of hanging digit clashes, cocoons, extra buds or variances in the bumps in the date.

The guide is broken down into two groups. The non-die-related errors group illustrates split, clipped and ragged planchets as well as delaminations, off-centres, broad strikes, die caps, multiple strikes, die cracks, struck-throughs and other planchet flaws. He packs in a lot of illustrations into the pages dealing with these types of errors. Wisely, no attempt is made to list these by year as they could occur in every year.

The other group is of die-related errors, which is broken down by decades starting in the 1950s. This group covers more than 200 pages. Nothing has ever come close to illustrating such an array of hanging digits in the date.

Because of the rather huge numbers of certain types of die varieties, Houle shows them in their own sections in 24 pages. These include the hanging digit in date, cocoon, extra bud, extra spine and teardrops.

The fact the guide is fully bilingual does not take away much space because the highlight of the book is definitely in the colour illustrations, which overshadow the limited text and explanations. As they say, a picture is worth a thousand words.

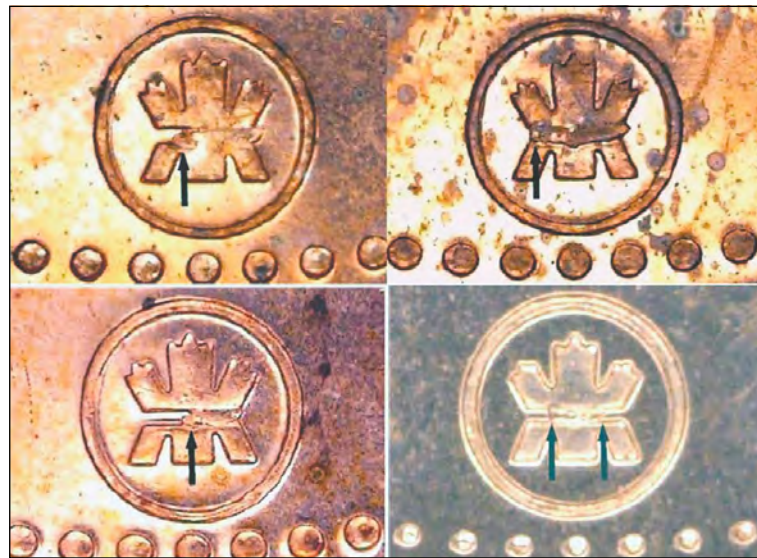
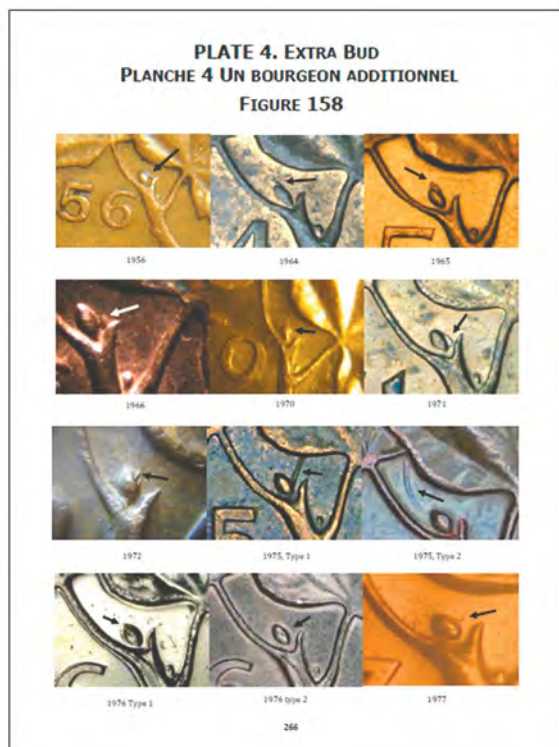


Illustration 3. The illustrations motivated this columnist to take another look at his potential die varieties.

Elizabeth II cents to take a closer look at the coins to see what they may have missed during previous searches.

I have been an acute hoarder all my life (my wife says there is nothing cute about that). I have an accumulation of at least 20,000 cents, most dated in the early 1960s. They are loose, not rolled.

I used them for the penny guessing game when I ran contests at the Toronto International Coin Fair. The winner always chose a cheque in the same amount, so I still have all these Uncirculated or Brilliant Uncirculated cents.

Based on the contents of the guide, I will be getting them out to review them. As much of a small variety freak I am, I never thought of looking at the tiny Mint logo (see Illustration 3), of which 14 different ones are listed.

Or the die chips in different places on both sides of the digit "1" in the date. Have you ever imagined anyone would discover and catalogue so many differences as a result of deterioration on different dies or progressive die deterioration, as shown in Illustration 4?

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Houle collected insects, starting with local butterflies when he was a teenager.

"I owned many thousands specimens from around the world, including many weird bugs, scorpions and huge spiders."

Obviously, he acquired his love for searching for errors and the tiniest of die varieties from studying the huge variety of insects.

"I collected 50-cent pieces from my grandfather's barber-shop," Houle told me. "I was fascinated by this big coin and its scarcity. My interest increased when a Hungarian uncle gave me a few holders to hold one-cent and five-cent pieces."

His uncle, Vincent Gaal, was an active dealer in Montreal between 1960-'80s.

To show the layout and the clear close-up photos that are typical in the guide, Illustration 2 shows one of the pages from the book covering the "Extra Bud" types, although the reduction in size here doesn't quite do it justice.

Houle assigned catalogue numbers to all listings, shown below each illustration. A summary sheet for each grouping explains exactly how the catalogue numbers are composed. This will enable Houle to simply add numbers in future updates.

He does not show the owner/source of the coin with each illustration. Instead, he shows the contributor's name and the catalogue numbers of their images on the glossary pages.

He also identifies his source of any images from the Internet. One benefit Houle had over previous cataloguers is the Internet provided him with illustrations of items that were either not in his collection or could not be obtained from dealers whose inventory he scoured over the years.

I was pleased he asked for my suggestions and comments over the past while, including requesting images of some of my errors, of which seven are included in the book.

I suspect a number of collectors who acquire the guide will be getting out their collection and jars of loose Queen

On a minor point, although most images are self-explanatory, I would have preferred the basic description of each error or die variety be shown underneath each photo for the rank amateur rather than having to scroll up a few pages on the DVD version or flipping back a few sheets on the printed version. However, this will not affect 99 per cent of collectors that have no problem identifying the name of most errors or varieties, especially since arrows point to defects in the die varieties.

"To make things easier, we decided to use codes that are easily understood and remembered," Houle told me in an e-mail. "While it will take a bit of effort in the beginning to master them, once mastered it will be easy to navigate through this guide and make the most of the information provided."

He felt the hobby needed to have a standard cataloguing system for varieties. This gave him the idea – and desire – to share his catalogue system with others in the hobby.

"The idea of a book on errors and varieties came from the frustration of a lack of a cataloguing system. Many times, I was disappointed for having bought duplicates at a coin show. It was the start to create my system. The one I created may not be the best, but I think it will help many collectors avoid the errors (of acquiring duplicates) I made in the past."

RENEWING YOUR SEARCH

I suspect a number of collectors who acquire the guide will be getting out their collection and jars of loose Queen

"I have no interest in foreign coins, with the exception of ancients and tokens," he states. "I love them because there's history behind them. Each time I go to a coin show, I look for an ancient coin and then learn about the emperor. It really fascinates me."

In his professional career, he taught ecology at a college for 25 years.

"As a biologist, I taught mainly how to study birds and insects. I'm a bird specialist. I was an active bird-watcher for decades. Now I'm more a book reviewer than a field watcher."

When he retired in 2017, his book became his retirement project.

"I have been interested in errors for a while. It started with classic varieties already listed in catalogues. When the RCM began to plate coins, especially the millennium series, I was astonished with the tons of errors that could be found. In that period, I began a 'roll hunting' career, which I still

do today. I prefer to find errors than getting ones already found by others!"

MEETING ROYALTY

When I asked Houle to send me a photo of himself to include with this column, he sent me a picture of the time he met Queen Elizabeth II. It is shown in Illustration 5.

"I hope this book doesn't have any big mistakes. I tried to use proper terms to describe errors, like delamination instead of lamination as you suggested in a recent column," Houle told me.

IN SUMMARY

His first press run was 100 copies.

Although I have found some minor typos, Houle has done an admirable job with the content, including photographs and layout.

Overall, he invented a catalogue system that will serve the hobby well. As an example, up to now, only a few "hanging digit" cents have been catalogued.

The very few listed by Hans Zoell just won't do for anyone who has accumulated a num-

ber of these types of die variations. We now have a good start to a comprehensive listing, to which Houle can add in an update as collectors bring additional varieties to his attention.

Printing a catalogue in full colour does not come cheap, so we have to weigh the price to the content. I have no hesitation in obtaining one for my library. I would even recommend it to those of you who

don't actively collect this type of material. I think you will find it interesting and informative. It makes a fascinating read for all collectors, no matter which other numismatic specialties interest them. Did I mention you will love the clear photographs?

If I have one criticism, I would pick the fact he illustrates a few cents with "rainbow toning" as if that was a good thing. I realize there are some collectors who like to collect toned coins, but ultimately, toning is not good for their resale value. It is a defect in the surface of the coin due to oxidization and ultimately reduces the value of a coin –

unless another collector of toned coins can be found.

He will soon start working on his second book, this on five-cent errors and varieties. In the meantime, I assume he is working on converting his two daughters, who are not interested in collecting coins at this time, to join him in his hobby.

To finish off this column, I am showing two strips of three photos from different pages in Illustration 6 to show the sharpness of the blow-ups of even the smallest portion of a cent. ❀

Newfoundland-U.S. mule raises eyebrows



Colonial TOKENS

In April 2018, collectors were captivated by the Doug Robins Collection of Canadian Tokens offered by Heritage Auctions.

We were not disappointed by this iconic auction, which included the many impressive lots.

Two that tweaked my interest were Lots 29193 and 29194, both brass pieces with a U.S. token obverse and a Newfoundland token reverse. These were derived from two dies not intended for use together – something referred to as a mule.

The obverse of the tokens portray an eagle with a shield in front of its left wing surrounded by a circle of 13 stars. The reverse of the tokens are from the reverse of the “Responsible Government and Free Trade” token of Newfoundland, which is listed by Pierre Breton in his 1894 book *Illustrated History of Coins and Tokens Related to Canada* as #955. It displays the caption “RESPONSIBLE GOVERNMENT AND FREE TRADE” around the rim and “AND / FREE / TRADE” in the centre with a dot between the letters “R” and “T.”

The tokens weighed in at 5.58 grams and 5.57 grams, respectively, and curiously, they have medal (↑↑) and coinage (↑↓) die axes respectively.

RESPONSIBLE GOVERNMENT & FREE TRADE

The Breton #955 obverse depicts the legend “FISHERY RIGHTS FOR NEWFOUNDLAND” within an outer ring around the border with the date of 1860 within an inner circle. There is also a dot between the letters “F” and “D” and a plain edge.

According to respected numismatist R. W. McLachlan, the Breton #955 – which he records as #493 in his 1886 book *A Descriptive Catalogue of Coins, Tokens and Medals Issued in or Relating to the Dominion of Canada and Newfoundland* – explains its obverse inscription “refers to the treaties made between the British and

American governments in which three mile limit is claimed.”

R.C. Willey elaborates on this theme in his article “The Colonial Coinages of Canada – Newfoundland,” which appeared in the July/August 1979 issue of *The Canadian Numismatic Journal*, the official publication of the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association.

“This scarce halfpenny was issued to commemorate the signing of a treaty in 1860 to regulate the fisheries,” Willey writes. “This treaty, to which the major fishing nations of the world were signatory, established limits within which only local fishermen were to be allowed to fish, removing a very serious complaint by the Newfoundland government against the mother country and other nations. By the terms of the treaty the signatory powers also agreed to control the conduct of their seamen when ashore in Newfoundland.”



Lot 29193 of the Doug Robins Collection of Canadian tokens was a Breton 955-related mule featuring a U. S. token obverse and a Breton 955 reverse. This brass piece weighs 5.58 grams and sold for \$1,920 USD.

However, our great interest here is with the reverse Breton #955 expression, which also adorns the mule reverse: “Responsible Government and Free Trade.”

“Responsible government was granted in 1855, and its blessing still tasted sweet in 1860,” writes Willey. “Free trade was far sweeter, for without it the colonies did not prosper. The end of the old mercantile system and the abolition of the Navigation Acts swept away a web of re-



strictions which retarded the development of the colonies for years.”

Willey also claims this token was issued by a St. John’s merchant and struck by Ralph Heaton & Co., of Birmingham, although he provides no evidence to support this. He also indicates there were two issues – 80 to the pound and 90 to the pound – and claims the reverse has linkages to some Prince Edward Island tokens by having a similar inscription to the hook E’s of some of the 1857 Prince Edward Island tokens.

AMERICAN EAGLE COINS & TOKENS

Eagles with shields can be found on numerous U.S. coins and tokens; however, I could not find any in authoritative books

It was “possibly a muling of dies intended for the manufacture of brass buttons” in the 1830s or ‘40s, according to the auction catalogue.

I also found a similar U.S. token in the Alan Scott Fisher Collection of Hard Times Tokens at hardtimestokens.com. This site lists three tokens – HT558A, HT558B and HT448C – all with a similar design and unlisted. While there are descriptions on the site, there are unfortunately no images. It’s described as brass, 27 millimetres and with an eagle and shield surrounded by 13 stars; however, in this case, the shield contains the numeral “9CTS.” The reverse is described as an intaglio of the obverse design.

According to the site, these tokens were offered as Lots 809-11 from the sale of the Benj Fauver Collection in July 2006.

HARD TIMES TOKENS

Typically, hard times tokens are classed as either merchant store cards or issued with a political theme.

The year 1832 witnessed an economic slump in Canada and the U.S. caused by a downturn in the English stock market. These “hard times” provided the context for the issuance of what are referred to as hard times tokens in the U.S.

Those issued with a political theme originated with the dispute between President Andrew Jackson and the United States Bank. The forerunner to the U.S. Reserve, the U.S. Bank was a semi-private institution.

It was to be renewed in 1836; however, President Jackson withdrew U.S. Treasury money from it and deposited it in local banks. Political themes on these tokens focus on this rift between Jackson and the bank.

During these “hard times,” a panic in 1837 led to the hoarding of coins in the U.S. The hard

times tokens emerged as a type of substitute coinage until stability returned.

RATIONALE FOR MULE

Other than saving time, money and workmanship by using existing dies, why would a mule be created by combining the reverse of a Canadian token with what is thought to be U.S. eagle, shield and stars?

The eagle typically represents courage or bravery while the 13 stars likely represent the original 13 U.S. colonies. While the legend “Responsible Government and Free Trade” was the sentiment in Newfoundland during the mid-19th century, it could equally be applied to the U.S., more likely during an earlier period.

Was this mule created simply to save time and money, or was the issuer attempting to get a message across? Was this token produced in the U.S. or Canada?

The tokens in the auction had opposite die axis (medal and coinage), suggesting the manufacturer was either careless or in a rush.

I believe this was definitely an attempt to send a message; however, the mintage appears to have been very small, suggesting it had very limited impact.

This may also have been the idea of someone’s experiment. Not liking the result, they would have ended the experiment after striking very few tokens.

Further research will be needed to answer many of these questions.

CURRENCY MUSEUM & AUCTION

Interestingly, despite its rarity, I was able to locate two of these tokens in the Bank of Canada’s National Currency Collection. They are both brass, and one measures 26.5 millimetres and weighs 5.56 grams while the other is 26.2 millimetres and weighs 5.47 grams.

How did these tokens fare in the Heritage sale?

Lot 29193, in Very Fine, realized \$1,600 USD on an estimate of \$900 while Lot 29194 brought in \$1,100 USD on the same estimate. 🍁

RCM launches double-concave silver coin among final 2018 issues

The Royal Canadian Mint has launched a 10-ounce silver creation coin design “to bold new depths” with a double-concave surface that varies in thickness by 12 millimetres.

The product of advanced testing by the Mint’s research and development lab, the 2019-dated \$100 Fine silver double-concave coin, “Nature’s Grandeur: Brown Bear,” measures 16 mm at its edge and only four mm at its centre. Artist Denis Mayer Jr. depicts an imposing brown bear (*Ursus arctos*) against a mountain backdrop, crossing a salmon-rich river in Western Canada.

The obverse features Susanna Blunt’s effigy of Queen Elizabeth II, which achieves a similar effect with its concave surface.

The coin is enclosed in a double-concave capsule to give collectors the full scope of its dramatic shape. It’s limited to a mintage of only 500 coins.

The second \$100 double-concave coin from this series will depict two wolves (*Canis lupus*) pausing at the edge of a cliff that gives them a commanding view of their territory. This coin is slated for release in February 2019.

KEEPERS OF PARLIAMENT

The Mint’s December releases also include the final chapter in the four-part Keepers of Parliament series.

This fourth coin circles back to where the series began – the ceremonial entrance to Parliament – where a regal lion has stood guard since 1938. Like its unicorn counterpart, the lion keeper of Centre Block rules the reverse of this 10-ounce coin, where its engraved likeness offers a tribute to Canada’s parliamentary stone carvers.



The 10-ounce selectively gold-plated 2018-dated \$100 Fine silver coin ‘Keepers of Parliament: The Lion’ features artwork by Patrick Bélanger.

Designed by Patrick Bélanger, the reverse depicts a heraldic lion standing before the sandstone-lined ceremonial entrance at Parliament Hill. The noble animal is deliberately positioned to convey the towering, 1.8-metre height of its real-life counterpart while gold plating highlights the Union Flag and the Shield of the Royal Arms of the U.K. The sculpted figure is paired with an ornamental flourish, whose floral motif is based on a frieze that also adorns the Centre Block’s grand entrance. The reverse includes the face value, “100 DOLLARS” and the words “CANADA 2018.”

The obverse also features Blunt’s effigy of Queen Elizabeth II.

The previous Keepers of Parliament coins were issued in June (“The Unicorn”); August (“The Beaver”); and October (“The Soldier”).

CANADA’S HISTORICAL STAMPS

The third and final piece in a series dubbed Canada’s His-

torical Stamps is the 2019-dated \$20 Fine silver coin, “Coat of Arms and Flags Special Delivery.”

Beyond historical pictorials and portraits, Canada’s philatelic history provides a sense of the nation’s mindset at a key moment in time. This stamp-shaped coin highlights Canada in the early 1940s, a time when the young yet proud country dedicated its resources to support an Allied victory in the Second World War.

The coin features a detailed reproduction of a Canadian special delivery stamp issued on July 1, 1942, to highlight Canada’s involvement in the Allied cause. The 10-cent stamp was designed by Herman Herbert Schwartz and engraved by

Silas Robert Allen with horizontal lines indicative of traditional intaglio printing or line engraving. By the fall of 1946, more than three million of these stamps were printed at the Canadian Bank Note Company’s facility in Ottawa, where some of Canada’s postage stamps are still produced today.

The pictorial collage features the former Arms of Canada within a shield atop a bough of maple leaves and flanked by four flags that represent Canada’s different military contributions. An application of modern colour mimics the deep bright green colour of the original issue, which had an inscribed denomination of “10 CENTS.”

The obverse features Blunt’s effigy of Queen Elizabeth II.

The previous coins from this series were issued in August (“Parliament Building 1920 Confederation”) and October (“Arrival of Cartier”).

OTHER DECEMBER COINS

Closing out the Mint’s year in numismatics are three other collectibles, including:

- a 2019-dated \$30 Fine silver coin, “Zentangle Art: The Big Horn Sheep,” featuring artwork by Jori Van Der Linde;
- the final two issues, “Big Spirit Moon” and “Little Spirit Moon,” from the Frank Polson-designed 2018-dated \$3 Fine silver coin series The Thirteen Teachings; and
- a new crystal-enhanced series showcasing the 12 zodiac constellations of the calendar year, starting with the 2019-dated \$5 Fine silver coin, “Zodiac: Capricorn,” also designed by Linde.

'Numismatic Fringe' reaches milestone



Numismatic FRINGE

This instalment of Numismatic Fringe marks my 50th column since I began writing it in 2015.

Long-time CCN readers may recall another column that appeared regularly from 1978 until December 2004 called "Trade Dollar News" (later renamed "Municipal Tokens"). The column was written by the late Jerry Remick and was the inspiration for Numismatic Fringe.

Remick's column started as a half-page bi-weekly piece but soon grew to a full page. During the 1980s, between 46 and 93 municipalities issued trade tokens annually, and he reported on them all.

From 2009 onward, the number of communities issuing municipal currencies dwindled, and soon, it seemed the hobby had all but died.

Fast forward to 2015, when I resurrected Remick's column somewhat; however, I renamed and reworked it to reflect the current times.

The new column, entitled "Numismatic Fringe," was created to cover new issues of medals, tokens, scrip and most other fringe items that are not legal tender and not necessarily good for any sort of exchange or financial transaction, unlike the municipal tokens of the past.

As I searched for new issues, I soon realized there were still



ternities were still issuing commemorative medals, but a lot of the information about them – mintage figures, availability and compositions – were not reported in the mainstream press. Promotion was generally very localized. I have been trying to correct this by including information about these types of numismatic items in my column.

It was a banner year for fringe material in 2017 with the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association's Canada 150 club medal program and numerous other organizations' numismatic issues to commemorate Canada's sesquicentennial. Ample material was discovered throughout the year and reported in my column.

CHALLENGE COINS, MILITARY THEMES

One collectible that has gained considerable traction and popularity among numismatists are challenge coins, which originated in the military but have recently been embraced by police, firefighters and other non-military type groups. It is a rapidly developing field.

In the past two years, commemorative fringe issues marking the First World War armistice and various other military events such as the Battle of Vimy Ridge provided a steady stream of fringe items. This certainly kept me busy with material to include in my column.

Going forward, I intend to keep CCN readers up to date about new discoveries, and I will include these issues along with as much information as possible in Numismatic Fringe.

It is a challenge at times to track down some of the issues,

however, and even when I do discover a piece, trying to determine where it can be obtained is sometimes difficult – but fun at the same time.

I am always on the look-out for information about numismatic fringe items such as medals, challenge coins, scrip or tokens issued by Canadian municipalities, coin clubs, fraterni-

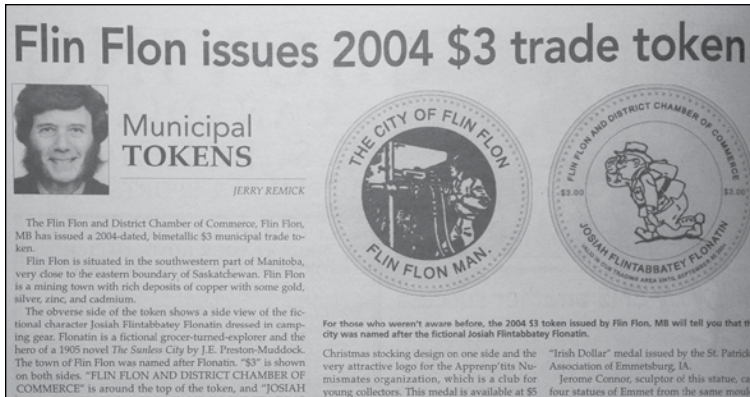
ties, organizations or merchants.

Remick's last 'Municipal Tokens' column was published in the Dec. 28, 2004 issue of CCN.

In the 1990s, the number of municipalities issuing trade tokens annually varied from 24 to 37, allowing for more background data to be printed about the issuing municipality and the tokens themselves. The hobby was booming. Dealers who carried only this type of material were common, and prices for scarcer pieces were climbing.

Toward the mid-2000s, however, many of the old-time collectors of municipal tokens began getting out of the hobby. Combined with a proliferation of high-denomination token issues, fewer issues in general and unsustainable prices, this hurt the hobby incredibly. It coincided with Remick's death in 2005 and the subsequent lack of information being released about what was being issued.

many of these types of fringe items being produced. Although the number of so-called "trade dollars" (municipal currency) had declined over the years, there were still some communities and organizations offering them to local collectors and souvenir seekers. Examples include the municipalities of St. Andrews, N.B.; Nanaimo, B.C.; and Trois Pistoles, Que., to name a few.

Many communities and organizations were issuing commemorative medals and scrip from 2009-15, but prior to the Numismatic Fringe column, they were escaping notice by the numismatic community because their existence was unknown and information was not being shared.

Another thing I noticed was coin clubs and numismatic fra-

Long-time exonomist, dealer Allan Davies dies

The Canadian numismatic community has lost a beloved collector and dealer, Allan Davies, who died suddenly on Nov. 14 at the age of 74.

Al was active in the hobby for more than four decades and probably for much longer; like so many of us, he was born a numismatist.

Al's hometown was Hamilton, but he spent much of his life in the Ottawa area. He worked at Statistics Canada until he took an early retirement in the early 2000s. Al's first Canadian Numismatic Association (CNA) Convention as a bourse dealer was in Hamilton in 1984, and his last was in Ottawa in 2016. He lived in sev-

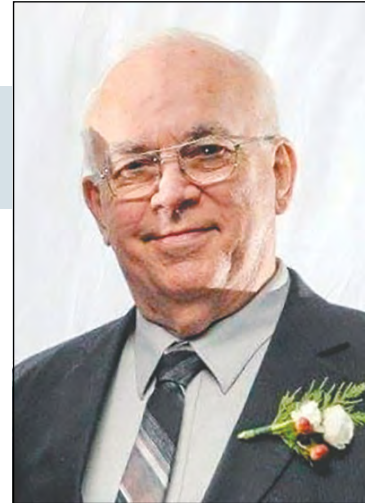
eral towns around Ontario before making his way back to Ottawa. He also worked in Harry Garrison's coin store in New Jersey for a couple of years and would accompany him to major shows in Canada.

Al was highly respected in the numismatic community, especially for his specialized knowledge of 19th-century Canadian tokens, and he was well known to many collectors throughout North America who shared his passion. He handled many rarities over the years and would often remark about how satisfying it was for him to be able to handle the early coins and tokens of Canada. Their rarity and historical significance were far more important to him than their condition. He truly loved the hobby.

Al was active on the executive of the City of Ottawa Coin Club through the 1980s and served as its president in 1986. He had a beautifully soft "radio" voice, and in fact, at one time in the early 1980s,

he hosted a collectors' phone-in show on a local Ottawa radio station.

Cheek recalls: "I first met Al at the City of Ottawa Coin Club in 1982 after I'd answered his ad in the Citizen

around the province. I learned a great deal from Al as we worked together on the coin club executive, then I succeeded him as president. Over the years, every time we met up at a show or convention we'd have a chat, he'd show me some exciting new

find, and I'd always thank him again for re-kindling my interest in the hobby we both enjoyed so much. Al always called me 'Old Fella' because I was nine days older than him and in return, I affectionately called him 'Big Al.'"

Neale recalls: "I got to know Al well over the 35 years that I knew him. We did several CNA Conventions together going all the way back to Hamilton 1984. I last saw him on Nov. 2, when we travelled together by train to and from Montreal for Nuphilex. He was in very good spirits on that day despite the fact that his bad

knee had significantly reduced his mobility; however, he soldiered on courageously and without complaint for the entire day.

"Al was a gentleman of the 'old school.' He was always courteous, humble and unassuming, totally honest, a man of his word, a true friend, and he was devoted to his large family and to his various pets. He was liked and respected by all who knew him."

Al is survived by his many loving children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

We'll miss you, Al. Everyone will.

Ron Cheek and Graham Neale both knew late numismatics and dealer Allan Davies for more than 35 years. A memorial service for Davies was held Nov. 22 at the Bridlewood Community Church of Nazarene in Kanata, Ont. Most of the obverse inscriptions are similarly illegible except for the "II" from "ELIZABETH II," "DA" from "CANADA," "D" from "D. G. REGINA" and "DOL" from "2 DOLLARS." The maple leaf at the top of the obverse is also poorly struck.

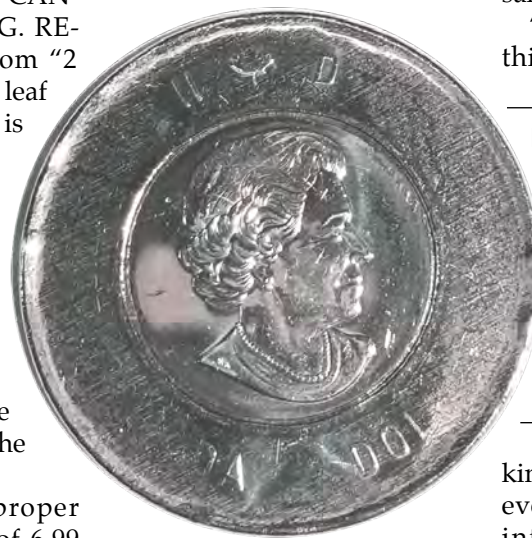
"I would say the die did not come down on it far enough. It stayed away from the coin because the design isn't really on the coin," said the coin's current owner, who added he believes it's "probably the only one in existence."

The coin has the proper weight and diameter of 6.99 grams and 28 millimetres, he said.

ONE OF A MILLION

A total of three million coins – two million selectively coloured and one million uncoloured – were issued nationwide.

Designed by Canadian artist Laurie McGaw, the coin's reverse is supposed to depict a Great War-era steel combat helmet and a poppy. Within the inner core, a soldier's "Brodie" helmet is shown



above a large poppy, which is inspired by Canadian physician and Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae's 1915 war poem *In Flanders Fields*.

Two more poppies are supposed to be engraved on the outer ring, which includes a

banner bearing the bilingual words "REMEMBER" and "SOUVENIR" as well as the year-date "2018."

The obverse features the effigy of Queen Elizabeth II designed by Canadian artist Sussanna Blunt in 2003.

kind. Errors are different from everything else, and I find it interesting how they can make these things and mess them up," said the Oshawa collector, who added he has been collecting for more than 50 years.

"I'll have to wait and see if anything else shows up, and then I might put it into auction." 🍁

commendable success has attended the efforts of the teaching staff during the past year, affording abundant proof of intelligent and faithful labour," reads the report produced by John Woodburn Langmuir, a government inspector for Ontario's asylums and prisons in the late 19th century.

"The steady advancement of the pupils and the general progress exhibited gave me great cause for satisfaction, and afforded proof that the system pursued is eminently practical."

Langmuir cites the presentation of two Governor General's medals – the aforementioned bronze piece and another in silver – as "one of the most interesting features of the examination."

In addition to these pieces, the institution is aware of two other Governor General's academic medals awarded to its students.

In 1875, a bronze medal was awarded to Andrew Noyes and a silver medal was awarded to "Miss I. McKillop."

The school has obtained both 1874 medals and is on the hunt for the remaining two known pieces.

145-YEAR-OLD MEDAL

About 140 years after it was presented, the 1874 Smith medal was acquired by collector and dealer Gary Miller from noted exonumist Tim Henderson, winner of the 2011 J. Douglas Ferguson Award.

It was then offered as Lot 1226 of the 2017 Toronto Coin Expo Fall Sale, where it went unsold; however, it didn't go unnoticed.

would be far more valuable to the archives or museum of the school."

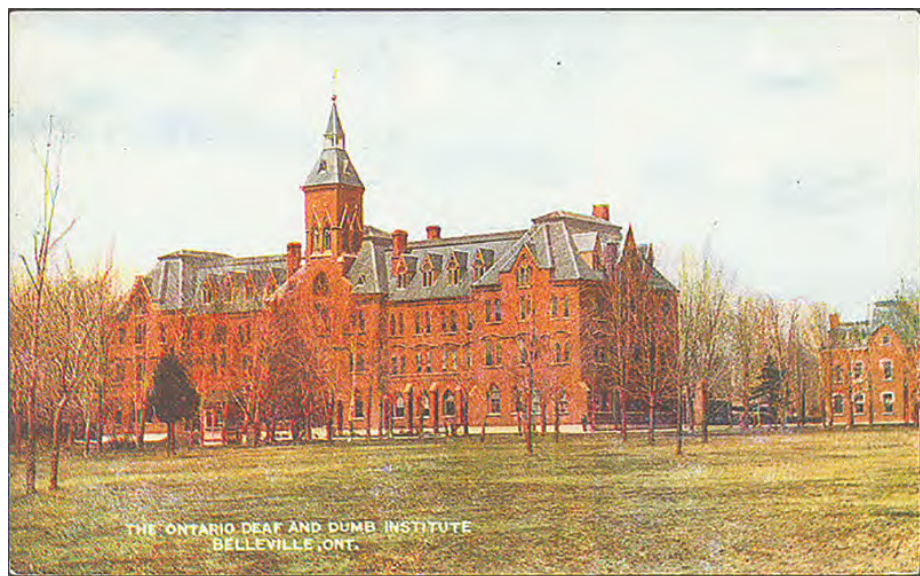
Stapleton, who's the past president of the Canadian Paper Money Society, echoed Miller's comments.

"You could see smiles on their faces as they reclaimed this piece of history for the institution. It was just wonderful to see them finally get it back after all this time," he said. "It's gone home. For me, as a collector or even a dealer, it's exciting when a medal finds its place – either a family or the institution it was issued for or from. It's something that was lost and then found."

The medal will be displayed in the school's museum for all to see, and Carbin is planning to publish an article telling its story.

"If it's in someone's desk drawer or safety deposit box, no one gets to enjoy it," said Stapleton. "Now, being on display, it can be enjoyed by future generations."

The institute is depicted in this 1910 picture postcard published by the Canadian View Card Co. A new building was constructed in 1921.



The bronze medal was awarded to Smith, a resident of Lanark County, which is about 150 kilometres north-east of Belleville.

The silver medal was awarded to William Kay, of Stratford, about 320 kilometres west of Belleville. Awarded for his work in the "Literary Department," Kay was published decades later in *The Canadian Mute* newspaper, highlighting his time at the institution.

"Both were the subjects of keen competition and much interest among the pupils," wrote Langmuir in 1875.

These are only two of the 61 medals issued under Frederick Temple Hamilton-Temple-Blackwood, Earl of Dufferin, who was Canada's third Governor General following Confederation in 1867.

A year later, the school's curator and historian Clifton Carbin contacted Jared Stapleton, owner of Metro Coin and Banknote and the bi-annual Toronto Coin Expo, about the Smith medal, which has an estimated value of \$800-\$1,000.

Stapleton then contacted Miller and brokered a deal with him and Carbin, who was a student of the Ontario Institution for the Education of the Deaf and Dumb from 1954-66, when it was known as the Ontario School for the Deaf.

"This is a feel-good story about how a medal was returned to where it belongs," said Miller, who's the owner of Londinium Coins. "I have a lot of academic medals, and honestly, I think rather than being sold to collectors, they

THREE NAME CHANGES

Originally called the Deaf and Dumb Asylum, the institution was the first school for deaf students in Ontario.

It was re-named three times:

- from 1870-1912, it was called the Ontario Institution for the

Education of the Deaf and Dumb;

- from 1913-73, it was known as the Ontario School for the Deaf; and

- since 1974, it has been called the Sir James Whitney School for the Deaf in honour of Ontario's sixth premier, James Whitney.

This "residential institution combined elementary school subjects with vocational training when it opened in 1870," according to an Ontario Heritage Trust plaque erected on the grounds of the school.

"Over the years, ever-increasing enrollment has promoted the steady expansion of the school's facilities and curricula."

The *Annual Report of the Inspector of Asylums, Prisons, and Public Charities* reported "the continued success of this useful Institution" in 1875. It listed 238 students – 155 males and 83 females – enrolled in the school at that time.

- Of this number 160 were under the age of 16 years, 56 under 21 years of age, and 22

over that age. This information shows that over two-thirds of the pupils entered were of school age, and therefore likely to obtain the full benefit of the instruction afforded by the Institution."

It also reported 50 students were supported by their parents, 177 were "admitted free as Indigent Pupils" and the remaining 11 were "orphans, supported by government."

A Sept. 24, 1903 story published by the *Ottawa Journal* explains of the nearly 1,200 graduates "who have been turned out by the institution, nearly all have been placed in good positions, as printers, engravers, carpenters, gardeners, tailors, dressmakers, or ladies' tailors. Of these there are at least 150 making good livings in Toronto."

Today, the school is home to about 100 students from all over the province, including northern First Nations communities such as Attawapiskat. Grades range from kindergarten to Grade 12, and the school has residences on campus. 🍁

HENDERSON & RENWICK

Gary Miller, owner of Londinium Coins, bought the 1874 Governor's General academic medal awarded to William W. Smith from "the biggest collection of Governor General's medals," whose provenance includes Tim Henderson and Barrie Renwick.

A resident of Florenceville, N.B., Henderson won the 2010 Paul Fiocca Award, which is the highest distinction presented by the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association (RCNA) and the second highest award in Canadian numismatics. Named a Fellow of the RCNA in 2014, Henderson is also the former chair of that association's awards and medals committee.

A Fellow of the RCNA since 2012, Renwick was frequently published in *The Canadian Numismatic Journal*, the official bi-monthly publication of the RCNA. Also a Fellow of the Canadian Numismatic Research Society, Renwick highlighted Canada's agricultural awards beginning with a medal featured in a July/August 2002 article. He has continued with extensive research into the topic of Canadian fairs and exhibitions and in-depth research about the recipient of these medals.

ACADEMIC MEDALS

Among Lord Dufferin's many accomplishments in office was the institution of two Governor General's awards, one for excellence in academics and another for excellence in sport. These medals are presented annually through the present day. The academic medal dates back to 1873, and over the past century and a half, they have become the most prestigious award students in Canadian schools can receive. They are awarded to the student graduating with the highest average from a high school or an approved college or university program. Pierre Trudeau, Tommy Douglas, Kim Campbell, Robert Bourassa, Robert Stanfield and Gabrielle Roy are some of the more than 50,000 people who have received the Governor General's academic medal. Today, the medals are awarded at four levels, including bronze (secondary school); collegiate bronze (post-secondary diploma); silver (undergraduate); and gold (graduate). The medals, which include no monetary award, are presented on behalf of the Governor General by participating educational institutions along with personalized certificates signed by the Governor General.

I always open the dialogue for these commentaries with, "For this issue, we are concentrating on Canadian" Yes, this issue focuses on 20- and 25-cent coins; however, there are no changes.

In my study of sales results for coins in general – and 20- and 25-cent coins specifically – the market appears to be heading along the same path as before. Sales at shows were mixed as the effects of the postal strike were serious for online sellers, impacting their cash flow, and thus, impacting sales at shows.

More than knowing the strike was taking place was the uncertainty surrounding when it was actually going to end. It went on a lot longer than I thought it would, and it seems long-term damage was done to the Canada Post Corporation as they lost corporate delivery contracts from companies that will probably never return. Online sellers need Canada Post to deliver packages, but other delivery companies have improved logistics enough to chip away at Canada Post's indented international delivery system.

If folded directly down the middle, the \$10 note from the Frontiers series would largely miss the portrait of Sir John A. Macdonald, whose ear and shoulder would be the only things impacted.

For comparison, the new \$10 note with the same centre fold would cross Desmond's face between her upper lip and nose.

Going back even further, eight of the nine denominations from the Bank of Canada's 1935 Series features the portrait on the far left side of the face. The other denomination – the \$25 commemorative note – features the dual portrait of King George V and Queen Mary directly in the centre; however, if folded down the centre, these portraits would remain virtually unscathed.

"I understand that wear on the centre portrait was subsequently addressed by moving the portrait of Queen Elizabeth to the right side for the 1954 issue," said Graham, who's a Fellow of both the Canadian Numismatic Research Society and the U.K.-based Numismatic Research Society.

The portraits remained on the right side of Canada's banknotes through the Scenes of Canada Series (also known as the "multi-coloured series") and the Birds of Canada Series, which was issued beginning in 1986.

For the Canadian Journey Series, which was introduced in 2001, the portraits moved to the left while "still avoiding the centre," said Graham, who's the research director as well as the honorary vice-president of the Canadian Paper Money Society, which he also served as president from 1989-91.

"The portraits may have been placed on the left to avoid circulation damage, which must have been understood as a result of the 1917 and 1923-4 Dominion note experience, but evidently it wasn't considered sufficiently important to prevent the portraits being moved back to the middle for the 1937 issue," said Robert Graham, former editor of the *Charlton Standard Catalogue of Canadian Government Paper Money* and the *Charlton Standard Catalogue of Canadian Bank Notes*.

This may have been done to balance the English and French text on either side of the centre portraits on the notes of the 1937 Series, which marked the introduction of bilingual Bank of Canada notes.

"While beginning to creep toward the centre, they essentially remained on the left for the polymer (Frontiers) series. Sir Robert Borden is perilously near the centre of the current \$100, although he is positioned slightly toward the left."

The \$10 commemorative note issued in 2017 features four portraits on its face. From left to right, they are Macdonald; Sir George-Étienne Cartier; Agnes Macphail; and Senator James Gladstone. Its midpoint is between Macphail and Gladstone.

"I don't think polymer notes are subject to as much wear and tear as paper notes were, so it is probably less of an issue now," said Graham, who added he thinks the placement of the portrait on the new \$10 bill "works well with the new design." 🍁

consideration for the Dauers," who are married doctors, Abramson said. "Their collection included many of the finest known examples," including an 1882 \$4 note in Extremely Fine condition and the 1935 Series \$25 note in both English and French.

"Collections like this rarely change hands intact and are scattered to the winds when they end up at public auction," Abramson added.

They continue to acquire banknotes from other countries of the British Commonwealth and plan to sell the balance of their collection in single country sales in the future, Abramson said.

"When you have the opportunity to buy a rare or unique note, you have to step up and pay the price as most likely you will not have an opportunity again to obtain it either at a private or public sale," said Edward Dauer, who insists on obtaining the finest and rarest notes whenever possible.

'WE ARE ONLY CUSTODIANS'

When asked why they decided to sell their Canadian currency collection, the Dauers echoed comments shared by many notable collectors.

"As relayed to us before by another well-known collector, we are only custodians of these notes during our lifetime, and at some time they need to be passed on to another collector to care for them for future generations," said Joanne Dauer.

The Dauers, who are residents of Coral Springs, Fla., assembled their collection of Canadian currency over a 30-year period. It included acquisitions from auctions as well as other private collections.

"Behind the scenes over the past three decades, Drs. Edward and Joanne Dauer were building a spectacular collection of Dominion of Canada and Bank of Canada notes," said Abramson. "Their collection starts with the 1866 series and ends with all denominations of the 1937 Series and is widely recognized as the most complete collection of Canadian banknotes ever assembled. It is spectacular."

The Dauers are also known for assembling the only complete type collection of U.S. silver certificates, legal tender notes and demand notes.

PAPER MONEY MARKET

"Twenty years ago, paper money in general was considered a backwater hobby whose specimens struggled to realize \$100,000 for a single item at auction," said Abramson. "It took until 2005 for the first U.S. banknote to bring \$1 million or more at auction."

That note was one of only three privately owned 1890 \$1,000 U.S. treasury notes, another example of which was sold by the Dauers in 2006 for \$2.1 million USD.

Known as the "Grand Watermelon" and considered the "holy grail" of U.S. currency, the note holds the No. 1 spot in Q. David Bowers and David Sundman's 2005 book, *100 Greatest American Currency Notes*.

This October, the Grand Watermelon sold in 2005 for \$1 million realized more than \$2 million during the third of-

fering of the Joel R. Anderson Collection of U.S. Paper Money. The fourth part of the Anderson sale will be held next February and is expected to bring more than \$35 million across all four sessions.

"For many decades, Canadian banknotes were pursued by a tiny percentage of collectors, keeping their prices historically at levels only a fraction of what their U.S. counterparts were bringing," said Abramson, who added he found no public record of a single Canadian note ever selling for more than \$350,000 at auction.

THE DAUERS

The Dauers were two of the founders of Mount Sinai Medical Center in Miami Beach, Fla., and Edward previously served as president of Florida Medical Services. The father of six was also on the Florida State Board of Medicine for 11 years, two of which were served as chairman.

The Dauer's collections have ranged from currency to vintage cars and even postage stamps.

They've authored two books, *American History as Seen Through Currency* and *100 Years of Australian History as Seen Through Banknotes*, which were published in 2003 and 2007, respectively.

The couple recently sold a group of 158 Australian currency notes during Heritage Auctions' Sept. 6 world currency sale in Long Beach, Calif. They started this collection after their 1982 honeymoon to Australia.

"Other collections of Australian notes have been brought to auction before, of course, but this is the finest-graded collection ever offered," said Heritage Auctions Currency Auctions Director Dustin Johnston. "The quality of this collection is unmatched." 🍁

Kingston barber among earliest Afro-Canadian numismatists



The World of MONEY

By Ted Banning

It is striking that almost all of the known numismatists in 19th- and early 20th-century Canada were men of European origin.

A few, however, were women, and at least one – Oronhyatekha – was Indigenous. While early numismatists of African heritage seem to have been rare, they are also likely underrepresented because they may have been less likely to join the social groups that preserved membership records.

Thanks to his listing in some numismatic directories, we do

have evidence for one 19th-century Afro-Canadian – a barber in Kingston, Ont., named Arthur Fields – who collected coins.

Fields was born in Kingston (then a part of Canada West) on Sept. 13, 1843.

His father, Joseph, may have descended from slaves the British captured during the American Revolutionary War. He also may have been brought to Lower Canada by United Empire Loyalists before Upper Canada's 1793 *Act Against Slavery* or Lower Canada's more subtle elimination of slavery in the 1790s.



Fields' home, which was also his barbershop, was located at 49 Princess St., Kingston, according to that city's census and directory.

In September 1840, Fields' parents married in Kingston. His mother, Charlotte Millar, was born somewhere in the U.S. (whether she was born free or into slavery I have been unable to determine).

The 1852 census lists Fields' father as a saddler in Perth, where he may have been working for Thomas McCaffrey, who was also a saddler.

Three years later, the Kingston directory describes Joseph Fields as a saddler and harness maker in that town. An 1858 directory shows him carrying on the same job but for James Jolley, saddlers in Hamilton, Canada West.

By 1861, he appears in the federal census as a saddler along with his wife and four children, including Arthur, who was the eldest sibling. The census taker documented the racial heritage of all members of the family as "M" for "mulatto."

LINDSAY TO KINGSTON

Sometime in the 1860s, Arthur married Ann Scott, whom the 1871 census describes as being of Irish ancestry. Both Arthur and their first son, Isaac, are described as having of African origin. By this time, Arthur was a barber and the family was living in Lindsay, Ont.

Soon, the family returned Kingston, and Foster's Kingston directories of 1884, 1886, 1889 and 1890 describe Arthur as either a barber or hairdresser. The address of both his home and his shop was listed as 49 Princess St. The 1891 census and Kingston directories of 1891, 1893 and 1895 also agree.

After Isaac's death, Arthur and Ann had another son, Arthur Ephraim George Fields, in 1888. He, too, died only about a year later, when they had a daughter, Mamie Roseanne.

One indication Fields was a numismatist comes from E. Renart's 1896 *Répertoire Annuaire Général des Collectionneurs de la France et de l'Étranger* (*Annual General Directory of the Collectors of France and Foreign Countries*). He's again listed at 49 Princess St., but there's no indication of what he collected.

Gnecchi and Gnecchi's 1903 edition of *Guida Numismatica Universale* also includes him but incorrectly lists his address (by 1897, he had moved to 45 Princess St.) and describes his collecting interest simply as a numismatic collection. Unfortunately, we appear to have no further information on that collection.

OTHER HOBBIES

Numismatics was not Fields' only hobby.

Volume six of the *American Kennel Club Register* lists him as the owner of three pedigreed black spaniels, "Lady Cora," "Help," and "Tory."

Despite being self-employed as a barber, in the 1890s, Fields was active in the early Canadian labour movement. He was one of the organizers of the Kingston branch of the Knights of Labor, a union-like association founded in 1869 and somewhat modelled after the Freemasons.

Some readers may recall another Canadian numismatist, David R. Gibson, was a prominent member of the Knights of Labor, which was instrumental in the establishment of the eight-hour workday and the holiday on Labour Day.

As a past master workman of the Knights of Labor, Fields tried to reorganize the Kingston District Assembly 10539 in 1895. His correspondence with Secretary-Treasurer John W. Hayes, who ousted Terence Powderly as grand master workman in 1893,

is cited in Gregory Healey and Bryan Palmer's *Dreaming of What Might Be: The Knights of Labor in Ontario, 1880-1900*. He also appears as a member of the district assembly's executive in several Kingston directories along with F. G. Barnet; William Kelley; George A. Barnet; D. J. Riley; J. I. Lee; and F. J. Jones.

Interestingly, Lee – assuming he was James Lee, of Kingston – was also an Afro-Canadian barber.

I have been unable to find an F. J. Jones, but James H. Jones, another Kingston barber, was also of African heritage according to the 1901 census. He may have been related.

These findings might suggest Afro-Canadians were well entrenched in Kingston's early labour movement.

In 1901, not only was Fields still involved as past master workman but the district assembly's meetings were held in his shop on Princess Street.

This was a second-hand shop, and by 1898, Fields ran next door to his barber shop at 45 Princess St.

The Kingston directories of 1903-06 list Fields as a barber and junk dealer at 43-45 Princess St. The buildings at both addresses – about halfway between Ontario Street and King Street – are long-demolished, and a parking lot now occupies the site. It is tempting to speculate Fields did a little coin dealing out of that second-hand shop.

Fields died of bronchitis in Kingston on April 27, 1911. His physician noted he'd been suffering from bronchitis for a month.

Ann and Mamie continued to live above the barber shop on Princess Street for a few years before moving to 16 Durham St. while Mamie was working as a conductor for the Kingston Street Railway, according to the 1918 directory. In 1919, Mamie married Oscar G. Fillion, who recently returned from service in the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

The family – like the Fields collection – largely disappears from the record after that. 🍁

I perused the Professional Coin Grading Service (PCGS) population figures for Canadian coins. There wasn't any evidence of bulging new supply of any particular date in the population of quarters.

Indeed, supplies seem fairly well balanced; however, collectors of this series were very thankful with the offerings that resulted from the Langdon family holdings and a few other outstanding tidbits that came to market after having been closely held for a couple of decades.

Such was the case for an 1887 quarter that long remained ensconced in an International Coin Certification Service Mint State-66 holder, now residing in a PCGS Mint State-65+ holder, fully deserving to be in a Mint State-66 holder. I mention this date as it is probably the rarest 25-cent coin.

As I write this, we are approaching the holiday season in Canada, and I think we are amazed and perturbed at how quickly the winter weather has enveloped our country. In Canada, none of us have seen much sanctuary from cold and snowy weather.

As is usually the case this time of the year, we are all get-

ting hunkered down for family time, and less time is spent on hobbies; however, with the speed of communication and the permeation of our lives with access to the Internet, it is harder to switch off our online focus. We have become so accustomed to searching for newly offered items or being notified of upcoming auctions, we have almost become afraid of missing something.

Indeed, there was a myriad of offerings at the end of December as well as the beginning of January. Colonial Acres Coins had a Boxing Day auction, and The Canadian Numismatic Company has a three-day sale in early January.

In the U.S., we have numerous auctions in conjunction with the annual Florida United Numismatists show in Orlando, Fla., and the New York International Numismatic Convention in New York, N.Y. The two U.S. firms with the most Canadian material are Heritage and Stacks Bowers.

At the end of January, the annual Canadian Association of Numismatic Dealers show is due to take place in Hamilton, Ont., featuring a selection of numismatic and military medals offering from Jeffrey Hoare Auctions.

Happy hunting and have a happy and prosperous New Year.

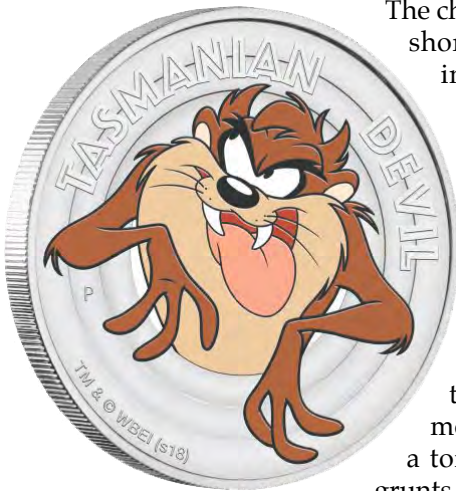

PERTH MINT

The fifth and final release in the Perth Mint's Looney Tunes series features the Tasmanian Devil, commonly referred to as "Taz."



The character debuted in the 1954 short *Devil May Hare*, featuring Bugs Bunny. Taz's personality is purportedly based on the real-life Australian marsupial, particularly its insatiable appetite and disagreeable temperament. Pacified only by music, Taz is ferocious, impatient, devious and prone to terrible tantrums. Chewing through almost anything, spinning like a tornado and emitting rough grunts, growls and screeches, he is like no other contemporary Warner Bros. cartoon character.

The coin's reverse features Taz appearing to burst out of the concentric rings of the Looney Tunes logo. The design also includes the inscription "TASMANIAN DEVIL" and the mint's traditional "P" mintmark. The Ian Rank-Broadley effigy of Queen Elizabeth II, the 2018 year-date and the monetary denomination are depicted on the coin's obverse.

Struck by the Australia-based mint from a half-ounce of 99.99 per cent pure silver, the coin is issued as legal tender under the authority of the Government of Tuvalu. The coin has a weight of 15.553 grams, a diameter of 32.60 millimetres and a mintage of 5,000 pieces.

U.S. MINT

The first palladium Proof coin struck by the U.S. Mint was recently issued south of the border.

The 2018 American Eagle one-ounce palladium Proof coin is the first collector version of the one-ounce palladium bullion coin introduced in 2017. Each coin contains one ounce of 99.95 per cent palladium and has a diameter of 34.036 millimetres.

The obverse design of the coin features a high-relief likeness of "Winged Liberty" from the Mercury Dime obverse by Adolph Weinman. In keeping with the original coin, inscriptions are "LIBERTY," "IN GOD WE TRUST," "2018" and Weinman's initials.

The reverse design features a high-relief version of the 1907 American Institute of Architects gold medal reverse, which was also designed by Weinman. The reverse of the palladium coin also includes an eagle and a branch. Inscriptions are "UNITED STATES OF AMERICA," "\$25," "1 OZ. Pd (the chemical symbol for Palladium), .9995 FINE" and "E PLURIBUS UNUM."
