## Rare bullion and medals on the block in spring sale

More than 1,200 lots featuring vintage gold and silver bars, rare Canadian tokens, coins, and banknotes are available at the Spring Premier Numismatic Auction.

Presented by Colonial Auctions, the April 5-6 sale will be held during the National Postage Stamp and Coin Show at the Hilton Mississauga. (See the sidebar story for more details on the popular two-day Ontario show.)

"Our dedicated efforts over the past year have allowed us to acquire an impressive collection of over 1,200 high-quality items, which will be featured in two separate sessions spanning two days," says co-auctioneer Todd Sandham. "We take pride in catering to collectors of all types, offering a diverse range of numismatic materials."

The lots include several rare Canadian coins and banknotes, featured in the April 8 issue of CCN. Also included in the popular auction are several vintage gold and silver bars and rounds, including a "seldom seen" one-ounce Handy & Harman of Canada gold coin (Lot 158). A round coin from a very limited mintage, this example has serial No. 413.

Another "rare issue" is a one-ounce round gold coin (Lot 161) issued by Johnson Matthey & Mallory in 1979. With a Queen Victoria obverse variety, the reverse features an LTEE-Beaver/Castor. Another "scarce" offering is a 50-gram gold bar issued by Engelhard Industries of Canada (Lot 164). With a blank obverse, the reverse has serial No. 3300.

## Symposium explores links between money and war

### Several topics to be covered at two-day Calgary event

"Money, War and More" is the theme of the Second Annual Numismatics Symposium presented by Nickle Galleries and the Calgary Numismatic Society (CNS).

"The Money, War and More" symposium examines the interplay between money, power and the capacity to wage war, starting in the ancient era and progressing through to the present," explains Marina Fischer, curator of numismatics at Nickle Galleries at the University of Cal-

gary. "It shows the crucial importance of economic power as the basic underpinning of all strategic considerations and strategies. This event hopes to draw attention to a connection between the history of war and money, an aspect of military power that is often ignored."

The April 27-28 symposium offers ten numismatic presentations by several experts from across Canada. It also includes two workshops that will assist collectors in "Making Good Purchases" and better understanding "Tools for the Coin Collector." See the story on page 26 for more details on the presentations and speakers.



"The reaction and feedback to last year's symposium was overwhelmingly positive," Fischer explains. "Comments also included great ideas and suggestions, one of them being to schedule the workshops one per day to balance the two-day program. I think this is excellent and we will try it this year. We are always open to suggestions."

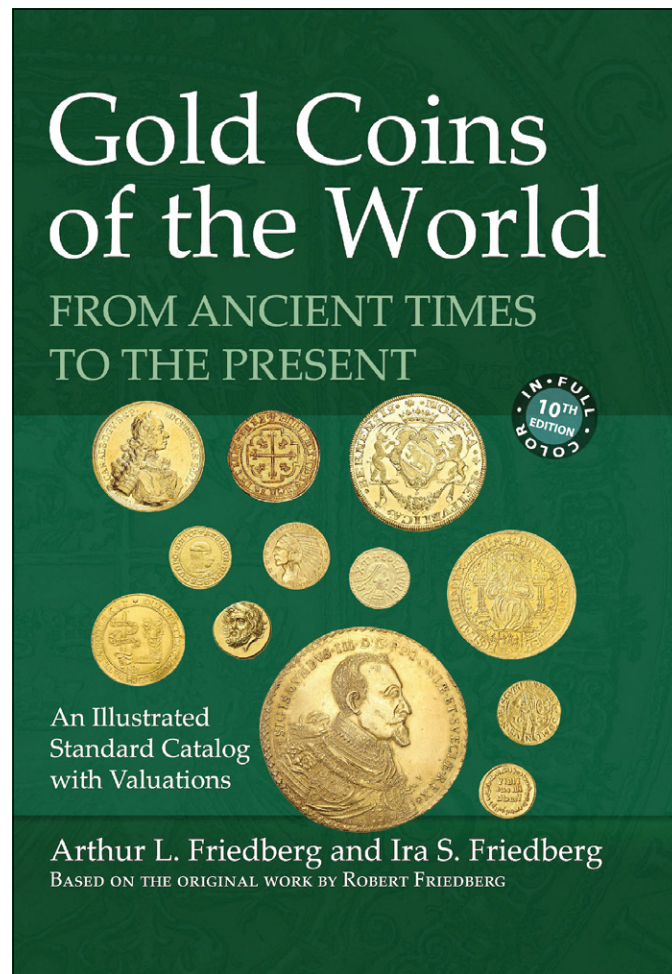

## PICTURES OF STOLEN BANKNOTES ONLINE

Numismatic dealers and collectors are asked to be on the watch for numerous Canadian banknotes and a more than 100-year-old Canadian gold coin stolen from a Burlington, Ont., residence on Saturday, March 2.

"It happened last Saturday in the early hours while we were away from home," emails the *Canadian Coin News* subscriber. "They cut the outside Bell internet and home security power lines before smashing through the rear patio glass door." Describing himself as "an amateur collector of mainly Canadian coins and notes," the subscriber said the thief or thieves made off with all of his Canadian banknotes, stored in two binders. In total, he says the binders contained up to 400 banknotes. Also stolen was a 1912 or 1913 \$5 Canadian gold coin.

"It was my wife's grandmother's, and (it's been) handed down to the eldest female child for four generations. It was not graded but was in excellent condition." The subscriber, whose identity we are not disclosing, said several banknotes and graded slabbed coins were stolen. However, "they did not take any of my silver coins. They even left half of them at the front door ... maybe, too heavy?" According to the subscriber, a 1937 \$2 banknote graded BC-22 Uncirculated Gem 66 is among the stolen banknotes.

Several coins, including Royal Canadian Mint products, have also been reported missing in a Rubbermaid container. To date, "I can see that my 2010 Paul Henderson is gone as well as 2012 Proof Set, 2022 wedding coin, 2022 RCM \$5 Queen Elizabeth coin, 2022 \$20 Imperial State Crown, 1687 Italian States Tari, Ancient Greece AR Tetradrachm, 1509-1547 Henry VIII Silver Groat, 1896 Queen Victoria ½ Crown and a 1289-1311 Italian Silver Grosso.

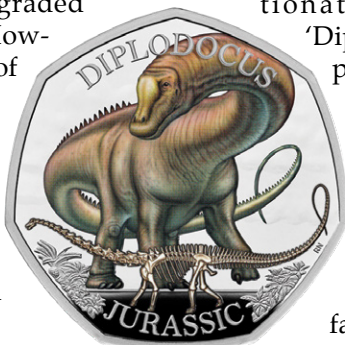
He added his wife's jewellery was also stolen. The victim says he purchased many of the reported stolen items from auction houses, some of whom he has contacted to alert them of the theft. Anyone with information on the theft or stolen items is asked to contact investigating officer Amanda Alsop of the Halton Regional Police at [Amanda.alsop@haltonpolice.ca](mailto:Amanda.alsop@haltonpolice.ca). The case number is 24-62280.

## THIRD 50-PENCE COIN HONOURS 'DIPPY' THE DINO

The Royal Mint has launched the third and final collectable 50-pence coin in its popular Dinosaur coin range, featuring the Diplodocus.

The Diplodocus coin has been inspired by the Natural History Museum's iconic Diplodocus cast, affectionately known as 'Dippy', the first Diplodocus to go on display anywhere in the world when it was gifted to the Museum in 1905. Arguably the nation's favourite dinosaur,



Dippy visited more than two million people during a two-year tour of the UK back in 2018, capturing hearts and imaginations.

The three-coin collection sees the iconic Tyrannosaurus, Stegosaurus and Diplodocus appear on their own coin. Each dinosaur has been designed by renowned British paleoartist, Robert Nicholls, with expert guidance from Professor Paul Barrett at the Natural History Museum. Based on current understanding and the expertise of leading palaeontologists at the Natural History Museum, each design is a scientifically accurate reconstruction of the dinosaur and the environment in which it lived. A selection of the coins available will feature colour, bringing the dinosaur to life on an official UK coin, depicting the dinosaur and its environment as it would have looked like.

# Antoninianus supplanted denarius in Roman Empire's economy



## Ancient MONEY

Caracalla could not have been a very nice man. After all, he murdered his brother Geta so that he wouldn't have to share the throne with him. When Septimius Severus died Feb. 4, AD 211, he left the empire to his two sons with the intention that they would reign jointly. They managed to do that for only a brief time. The brothers were far from close. In fact they hated each other and bickered constantly, often requiring their mother Julia Domna's intervention as peacemaker. They greatly distrusted and suspected each other. According to Herodian, on the journey back to Rome with their father's ashes and Julia Domna, they refused to stay at the same inns or eat together for fear of being poisoned.

Late in 211 Caracalla murdered his brother and henceforth reigned as sole emperor. In 212, he carried out a purge of Geta's followers, during which thousands of people were killed.

The greatest action of Caracalla's reign was the granting of Roman citizenship to all free inhabitants of the empire. He also "made his mark" on Roman coinage, introducing a new silver coin with a value of two denarii in 215. We know the new double denarius as an "antoninianus," named after him (Caracalla was a nickname: his actual name was Antoninus), but it probably wasn't called that during his lifetime. His portrait on this

coin, like that on the brass dupondius – also a double denomination – wears the radiate crown of Sol, the Roman sun god. Antoniniani of empresses, beginning with Caracalla's mother Julia Domna, were differentiated from denarii by having a crescent, representative of the moon goddess Luna, behind their shoulders.

By the time of Caracalla's reign, continued debasement of the denarius by previous emperors had greatly reduced the silver content of

the coin. At the time of the new coin's introduction, it weighed the equivalent of only 1½ denarii, but was almost certainly valued at two.

On April 8, 217 Caracalla was in the east, travelling from Edessa to Carrhae to perform a religious rite – his mother came from a line of Syrian priests – when he was set upon and stabbed to death by a common soldier on the orders of M. Opellius Macrinus. Macrinus then seized the throne and reigned



from April 11, 217 to June 8, 218. For a brief time early in the new reign, the antoninianus continued to be struck in the names of both Macrinus and his son Diadumenian, but was soon discontinued.

Macrinus and Diadumenian were overthrown and killed in early June 218, replaced on the throne by Marcus Aurelius Antoninus (birth name Varius Avitus Bassia-

reign (April 22 to July 29, 238) of the hated joint emperors Balbinus and Pupienus. It retained the radiate crown on the imperial portraits.

Coins don't always tell the truth. These two new rulers, appointed by the senate in the face of an emergency – the advance on Italy of the tyrannical emperor Maximinus I – quickly came to detest and distrust each other. This didn't stop them from producing some issues of the antoninianus depicting clasped hands on some of their reverses, proclaiming the harmony and goodwill of the two co-emperors.

Following the murder of Balbinus and Pupienus by the Praetorian Guard, the imperial title was bestowed upon Gordian III, a 13-year-old youth who was caesar (heir apparent) under the two deceased emperors. Gordian continued to strike the antoninianus, both with his own name and portrait, and with those of his wife Tranquillina. He also issued a substantial number of denarii, the last time any emperor would do so. The antoninianus quickly drove the denarius out of circulation and became the main denomination of the Roman Empire for the rest of the century.

Gordian III was overthrown and killed in February 244. He was succeeded on the throne by Philip I (AD

244-249). Philip issued silver denarii in his own name and also for his wife, the empress Otacilia Severa and his son Philip II. In 248-249, two short-lived revolts broke out under the leadership of one Pacatian in the province of Moesia, and under Jotapian in Cappadocia and northern Syria. Both of these wannabe emperors struck silver antoniniani with their names and portraits. These coins are now scarce.

After the defeat of the two rebellions, both Philips were murdered and the general Trajan Decius was proclaimed emperor in their stead in September 249. During his reign, silver antoniniani were issued on behalf of himself, his wife the empress Herennia Etruscilla, their eldest son and Decius' eventual co-emperor Herennius Etruscus, and their younger son the caesar Hostilian. Both Decius and Etruscus were killed in battle against invading barbarian forces in mid-251.

They were succeeded by the general Trebonian Gallus, who reigned until the summer of AD 253. He gave Hostilian – who had been left in Rome when his father and elder brother went to fight the invaders – the rank of co-emperor, and had antoniniani struck for him as such. However, Hostilian died of a plague epidemic that was ravaging Rome after enjoying his new role for just a few months.

For those who have doubts about the nature of Hostilian's death, there really was a plague in the Roman Empire at this time. Dates may vary somewhat, but the most commonly accepted estimates are either from AD 249-262 or from 251-270. At the height of the affliction, it is thought that 5,000 people were dying per day in the city of Rome.

# Bust and Harp variety proves its rarity at auction



## Colonial TOKENS

In his 1886 book *A Descriptive Catalogue of Coins, Tokens and Medals Issued in or Relating to the Dominion of Canada and Newfoundland*, numismatist R.W. McLachlan indicated that the Bust and Harp tokens of Lower Canada comprised more than 10 per cent of the copper circulation 30 years prior, which would be about the mid-1850s.

The obverse of the token (Breton No. 1012) depicts a laureate bust on armour facing left – one variety faces right – and the reverse portrays a harp with the year 1820. Varieties include the number of strings in the harp as eight, nine or 10 and differences in the position of the laurel leaves. Edges are all plain.

In his 1907 monologue *The Canadian 1820 Bust & Harp Tokens*, Eugene Courteau detailed 26 varieties. These are all of brass composition except for two that are copper, one of which (Courteau No. 25) has an identical brass counterpart (Courteau No. 26). Courteau described its obverse as “a very rude bust on which the usual side curls are poorly executed, narrow

and do not touch; six flaps to the cuirass; four ruffles to the shirt frill.” On the reverse, “the first string is attached to the wing; the three shamrocks on the body of the harp are connected; the foot of the harp points between the 1 and the 8. A large centring point appears among the strings.”

More recently, Gregory S. Ingram and Brando Marelic list this copper token in their 2004 book *The Bust and Harp Tokens of Canada* (BH-25). Their book adds details to the description including: coinage die axis (↑↓); plain edge; when present, the date is closer to the edge than to the harp; the figures are well spaced, with the 2 closer to the 8 than to the 0. The same die was used to strike the BH-25 and BH-26 varieties, so their description is the same except that the composition is copper for the former and brass for the latter.

In addition, Ingram and Marelic add the following clarification. “This token is struck inconsistently. On some tokens harp top is struck well while angel is not. On the other tokens this just may be opposite.”



A copper example (Courteau No. 25 /BH-25) was offered as Lot 2729 in the Extravaganza Sale II conducted by the Canadian Numismatic Company (TCNC) on Nov. 13, 2023. Its description includes copper composition, a weight of 3.15 grams, a coinage die axis and in VF condition or better. From their image, it is clear that this token is well worn with only partial depictions of the harp and bust design visible. I could not see any numbers in the date in the image. So who struck this token and for what purpose?

### HISTORY OF THE TOKENS

McLachlan’s 1907 paper “The Real Date of the Canadian 1820 Harp Tokens” attempts to address the token’s origin.

An overabundance of Wellington and other tokens introduced into Lower Canada in the early 19th century became depreciated. Consequently, the government passed laws to prohibit the importation of base and counterfeit coins, but failed to supply a legal copper currency to fill the gap.

McLachlan asks, “Why could they not set up mints at home and thus avoid the difficulties of the custom house?” About 1825 they did just this by imitating the worn coppers in circulation. Today we refer to these as Blacksmiths. However, these too

became discredited by their over-abundance. With the private mints now closed and the custom house continuing to block imported coins what was the solution? According to McLachlan, this was remedied by using “an old token or one dated back several years.”

An imitation Irish half-penny of George III was selected and sent to a Birmingham mint to “strike off a coinage similar in all respects.” Due to some confusion “the bust of the reigning monarch was substituted for that of George III and the date advanced to 1825, the actual year of issue.” George IV became monarch early in 1820. This coin was well executed and a small number issued before the date mistake was discovered. This was resolved by altering the die by creating a 0 to overlap the 5.

Due to the popularity of this coinage, a coiner in Lower Canada had a “second-class engraver” produces dies in Birmingham, where imitations were struck and exported from about 1826-27 until 1830, when McLachlan alleges dies were engraved in Canada and further imitations were struck.

McLachlan identified 24 varieties, with four struck in England and 20 in Canada. Nineteen Canadian varieties were struck by one firm between 1826 and 1835.

A single variety (McLachlan No. 24), identical

to the one described above, was struck by a single coiner around 1833. McLachlan also indicated it was struck in both copper and brass. His obverse has six flaps to the cuirass and the shirt frill is in three squares joined. The reverse harp has eight strings. He described it as “ruder and more in outline than any of the others. No date.” McLachlan observed that the obverse and reverse differ from all others and concludes that it was struck by a different coiner. There can be no mistake that this refers to the same tokens described by Courteau, Ingram and Marelic.

The details and workmanship of this token closely resemble that of the Blacksmith series: tokens allegedly struck by a Montreal blacksmith using well-worn dies to present the appearance of being accepted in circulation. Curiously, Courteau did not seem to include it in his May 1908 article “A Blacksmith Token,” despite it being published a year after his monologue on the 1820 Bust and Harp tokens previously referenced. On one token (No. 2), the bust is similar, however he cannot determine the number of strings on the harp, making it difficult to attribute. Nor is it recorded by Howland Wood in his April 1910 paper “The Canadian Blacksmith Coppers,” despite Wood cataloguing three examples bearing a bust and harp.

The TCNC website for Lot 2729 indicates only seven specimens known, meaning this token has a high degree of rarity. Ingram and Marelic score the copper variety at R9 on their rarity scale, meaning “extremely rare – found with extreme difficulty. Lucky to acquire one in a lifetime.” They score the brass variety at R7, meaning “quite rare – found with greater difficulty.”

Lot 2729 realized \$1,553 on an estimate of \$600 to \$1200. ♦

# Identifying error a challenge for experts, readers



## Errors & VARIETIES

By John Regitko

Two issues ago, I covered the coin shown in Figure 1 in quite some detail.

I asked you to send me your thoughts and conclusion about the unusual coin. I offered an extension to the subscription of the reader that provided the most accurate and best explanation.

The first photo in Figure 1 shows the normal reverse of a 1981 cent.

The wording on the PCGS slab states that it is: "Error: 1981 1c PCGS Choice Mint State-63RB. Struck on 1.1 gr Split Planchet."

I draw your attention to PCGS stating that the coin was struck on a split planchet.

### THE ERROR SIDE

The second photo in Figure 1 contains a rather faint image of the maple leaves found on the Canadian cent.

The appearance of this design caused the good folks at the Canadian Numismatic Company (TCNC) auction house to add to the description: "Holder indicates Unifaced, looks more to be Brockage strike."

That description makes sense, but only to a degree, since there are designs on both sides.

A brockage strike consists of a design that is not only a mirror image, but also incuse due to the previously struck coin sticking to the die and impressing its design onto one side of the blank. This creates a normal design on one side and an incuse design from the previously struck coin on the other.

### BROCKAGE OR UNIFACE?

It is difficult to determine from the photo if the design on what would normally be the obverse side is incuse or raised. If the design is incuse, it would make it a full brockage strike, as the auction house states.

If the design is raised, it would be something else entirely, but not a unifaced strike, as stated on the PCGS certification label.

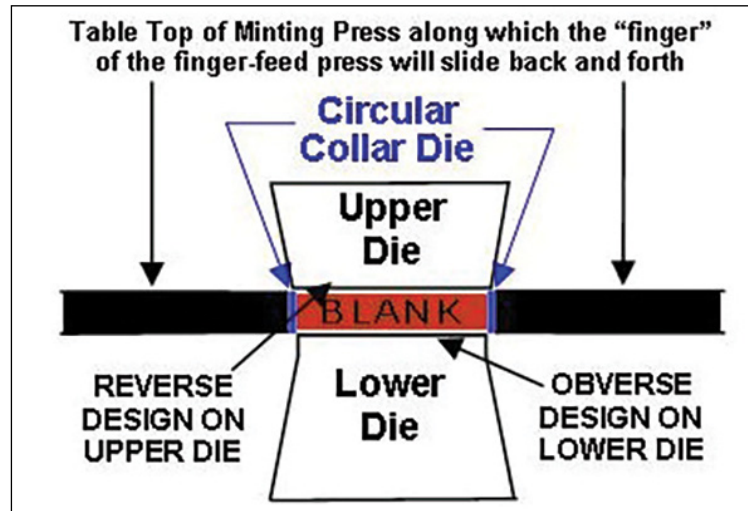


Figure 2. A side view of the finger feed press shows the position of the dies at the moment a blank is struck.

ment whose movement depended on gears and joints and old-style motors that didn't always work in unison.

Other than a quantity of errors and both intentional and unintentional die varieties, the other thing that benefited the error collector is that the mechanical arms and other moving parts had to be regularly lubricated with grease that, fortunately, dripped onto the bottom die or on top of the blank, giving us some wonderful "struck-through" errors.

### FULL BROCKAGE STRIKE

A full brockage, which TCNC called the error in Figure 1, is produced when a just-struck

would normally contain an image of the queen.

### NORMAL STRIKE

To fully analyze what the error coin in the TCNC auction actually is – whether a split planchet, brockage or something else entirely – I must explain what a full brockage looks like.

Figure 2 shows the location of the dies as the blank is struck.

The blank sits inside the collar die and on top of the lower die. The upper die came down on the top of the blank, fully enclosing it from all sides. At this point, the "finger," which is a metal plate with a hole in a specific location, receded to pick up a new blank that will drop into its cavity through a chute mounted above the location of the hole in the finger.

As soon as the blank is struck, the upper die and lower die, along with the coin, move upward in unison and stop exactly when the bottom of the just-struck coin is a smidgen above the minting press' "tabletop" as it sits on top of the bottom die.

### NORMAL EJECTION OF A COIN

While the dies strike the blank, the finger is receiving a new blank in its hole and starts moving forward toward the striking chamber.

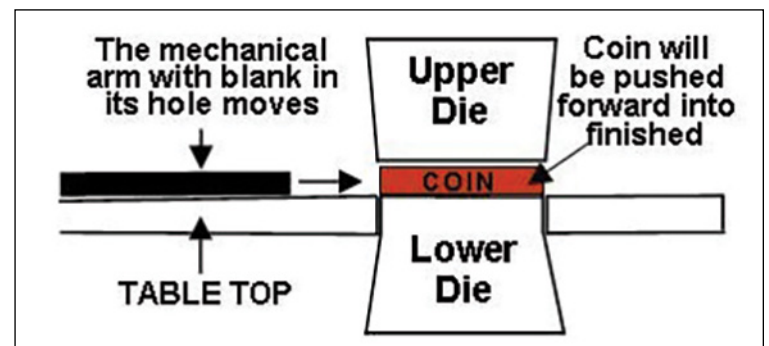


Figure 3. The dies are shown when the mechanical arm moves forward with a new blank.

Figure 3 shows the moment when the just-struck coin is about to be pushed forward by the curved front of the finger and into the finished coin bucket. This is easily accomplished because the coin is sitting on top of the bottom die, level with the tabletop on which the finger is gliding.

The upper die moves enough out of the way that it will not interfere with the movement of the finger bringing a blank in and moving a coin out. The forward movement of the finger stops when the incoming blank is perfectly over the cavity of the collar die.

This allows the blank to drop, by gravity, into what we call the striking chamber, which is the cavity of the collar die, and then rest on top of the bottom die.

All this occurred at the rate of up to a few hundred blanks per minute with mechanical equip-

coin accidentally sticks to the upper die and travels upward with the die, rather than sitting on top of the bottom die and waiting for the arm to push it forward into the bin for finished coins at the back end of the minting press.

It is understandable that coins sticking to the upper die would occur, because the design from the dies moulds the metal of the blank into the grooves of the dies and vice versa.

Combine this with the acute heat created by the hundreds of tons of pressure the dies apply to the much softer blank and it becomes obvious that some fusing is bound to occur.

### CAPPED DIE

If you were now to look at what is normally the bottom design of the upper die, you would see the normal obverse design of the just-struck coin. When the next blank is brought in by the finger feed and lands in the striking chamber, it will get struck normally by the bottom die with

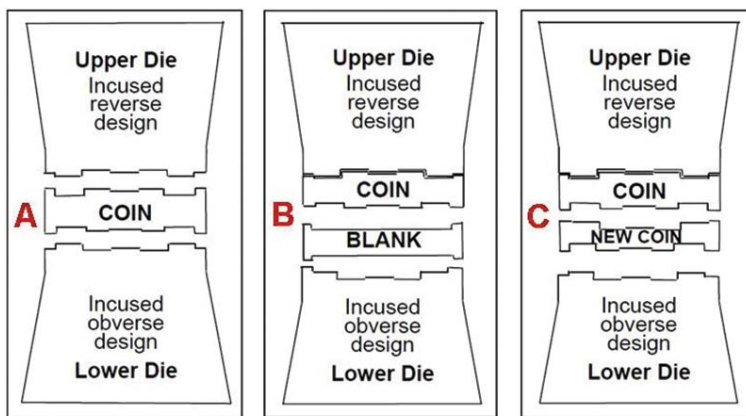

the obverse design. However, the upper die is capped by the previous struck coin, whose bottom side will now act as a faux pas upper die.

Since the exposed design at the bottom of the faux pas die is a normal obverse design, the new blank will wind up with an incuse obverse design. The result is a new coin with two obverse designs: a normal raised obverse from the bottom die and an incuse (mirror image) design from the upper faux pas die.

All of the above sounds so technical that you might have to re-read to digest it step by step. Heck, I had trouble myself and had to re-read it about a dozen times and make changes before I was satisfied that the explanation is correct and, hopefully, makes sense. Taking it even a step further, to better help you digest the process involved with

the creation of the coin in Figure 1, the major steps required to create a full brockage are shown in Figure 4.

#### NEITHER BROCKAGE NOR UNIFACE

Whatever the PCGS slab states about it being struck uniface on a split planchet, or TCNC's assertion that it looks more like a brockage strike, something else happened with the coin in Figure 1.

When two driving forces in the hobby come to conclusions, you pay attention. When the same two driving forces come to different conclusions, you realize that not everyone is perfect.

#### READERS' RESPONSES

I offered an extension to the reader that sent me the correct

answer as to the actual cause of this error

I thought I might get a pile of responses if I offered a subscription extension. Instead, I thank all readers for the errors I

bought with the money from internet seller K-Sizzle for a future column dealing with all that spilled metal on the Second World War nickels that they had available at very reasonable pricing.

#### THIS AUTHOR'S CONCLUSION

When I saw the listing with the different conclusions, I made it my mission to figure out who I thought was right.

As it turned out, it was really not difficult if you, as they say, "follow the science."

I followed the minting process until I reached the point

that supported either the PCGS or TCNC point of view, or hit a road block.

However, due to space limitations for the column, I am able to give you until the next issue to figure out what the error is, even though the contest has ended.

I am positive that I have the answer and, surprisingly, it is neither of the two offered in the auction listing. I will also comment on the errors and whether the successful bidder got a good deal. ♦

Upon the death of Hostilian, the emperor Gallus elevated his own son Volusian, who until then had been relegated to the rank of caesar, to the position of co-emperor. Gallus issued silver antoniniani in his own name upon succeeding to the throne. Most of Volusian's antoniniani date from after his elevation as emperor. ♦

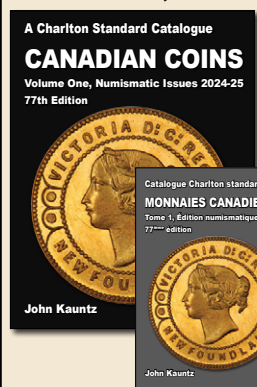

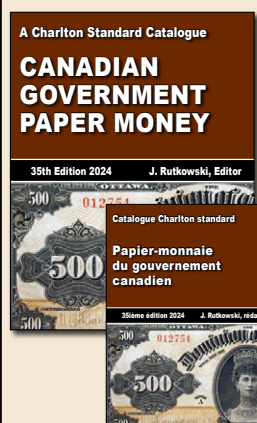

One of the less common design elements of commemorative coins, and coinage in general, is the dual portrait. Dual portraits are typically used for royalty, especially coronations, weddings and anniversaries, or the changeover from one monarch to the next.

Double portraits were used on many of the old silver coins from the German states, especially when it came to weddings or anniversaries of members of the royal family, notably in regards to monarchs. Many of the other dominant European monarchies of the late 19th and early 20th centuries issued similar designs.

### RUSSIA, 1913: MICHAEL I AND NICHOLAS II

One of the earliest coins of the 20th century to feature a double portrait was produced to mark 300 years of Romanov rule in Russia. The death of Feodor I without an heir resulted in 15 years of political upheaval and false claimants, known as the Time of Troubles.

The Zemsky Sobor (parliament) elected 16-year-old Mikhail Romanov as the new emperor on Feb. 21, 1613.

Mikhail I was the first cousin, once removed of Feodor I and the great-nephew of Anastasia Romanovna, wife of Ivan the Terrible.



The obverse of the coin features a portrait of Mikhail I on the right side, with a portrait of Czar Nicholas II on the left side. Mikhail is wearing Monomakh's Cap, one of the earliest symbols of Russian aristocracy, dating to the early 14th century. Nicholas II is depicted in a military uniform. The portraits are mostly surrounded by a circle and outer ring of alternating dots and lines.

The reverse depicts the coat of arms of the Russian Empire, with a double-headed eagle holding a sceptre in one claw and a globus cruciger in the other. On the chest of the eagle is the arms of Moscow, while several smaller arms can be seen



on either wing. Each head of the eagle is wearing the Imperial Crown, with a larger Imperial Crown directly above. Legends include "RUSSIA," written in Cyrillic (РУБЛЬ), and the dual dates "1613-1913." The alternating dot and line pattern completely encircle the design.

The coin also serves as a rather ominous bookend for the Romanov dynasty, with the abdication of Nicholas II on March 15, 1917, and the eventual execution of the Romanov family on July 17, 1918, during the Russian Revolution.

### NETHERLANDS, 1980: JULIANA AND BEATRIX

In 1980, the Royal Dutch Mint produced two separate coins celebrating the investiture of the new queen. Following the abdication of Queen Juliana on her 71st birthday April 30, 1980, her eldest daughter Beatrix became the new queen of the Netherlands.

Juliana was the only surviving child of Queen Wilhelmina, who had suffered multiple miscarriages and stillbirths. During the Second World War, Juliana is famous for having lived in exile in Ottawa with her two daughters, Beatrix and Irene. She also gave birth to a third daughter, Margriet, during her time in Canada. Canadian hospitality during her stay, as well as Canada's involvement in the Liberation of the Netherlands on May 5, 1945, resulted in her donating 10,000 tulip bulbs to Canada each year as thanks.

Queen Beatrix oversaw the gradual independence of many Dutch overseas possessions. She proved to be an extremely popular monarch and was famously kissed by a bystander on Queen's Day, April 30, 1980. Beatrix abdicated in favour of her son Willem-Alexander, on April 30, 2013, the 33rd anniversary of her accession as queen.

The obverses of the two 1980 coins feature a portrait of the



former queen, Juliana, at the left, flanked by portrait of the new queen, Beatrix. The portrait of Beatrix partly overlaps that of her mother, serving as the primary image. The date "30 APRIL 1980" is at the top centre, with the legend "BEATRIX KONINGIN DER NEDERLANDEN" encircling the design.



The reverse features an escutcheon from the Dutch coat of arms, with a lion rampant wearing a crown and holding a sword in one paw and seven arrows in the other. A large crown sits atop the escutcheon. The year of issue is written near the top, on either side of the shield, while the country and denomination are identified along the bottom.

### DENMARK, 2004: FREDERIK AND MARY DONALDSON

The Royal Danish Mint produced a special 20-kroner coin to celebrate the marriage of Crown Prince Frederik and Mary Donaldson. Frederick is the eldest son of Queen Margrethe II and – at the time – the heir to the Danish throne. He studied political science at Aarhus University, as well as Harvard University, and is the first Danish royal to complete a university education. He is also an avid sportsman and former member of the International Olympic Committee.

The two met while attending the Summer Olympics in Sydney, Australia in 2000. Frederick was visiting with his brother, Prince Joachim, as well as other

members of European royal families. The two maintained a discreet, long-distance relationship for about a year, before the relationship was publicized in November 2001. On Oct. 8, 2003, Queen Margrethe II gave her consent to the marriage at a state council meeting, and the two were married in Copenhagen on May 14, 2004.

The reverse of the coin celebrating the event features right-facing portraits of Crown Prince Frederik and Crown Princess Mary, with Frederik's portrait being the dominant image. Mary is depicted wearing a pearl necklace. The inscription on the coin, which runs clockwise from the bottom centre, reads "KRONPRINS FREDERIK KRONPRINSSE MARY 14. MAJ." The denomination is identified at the bottom centre.



The obverse features a right-facing portrait of Margrethe II, with her hair tied up in a bun, wearing a tiara and necklace. The legend reads "MARGRETHE II DANMARKS DRONNING" (Queen of Denmark), with the year of issue at the bottom centre.

The crown prince became the new king of Denmark, as Frederik X, on Jan. 14, 2024, following his mother's abdication on the 52nd anniversary of her ascension as queen. Crown Princess Mary became the first Australian-born queen consort of a European monarchy.

This will be a semi-regular feature over the course of the year. Join me in Part II as I explore dual portraits from Australia, Monaco, and Sweden. ♦

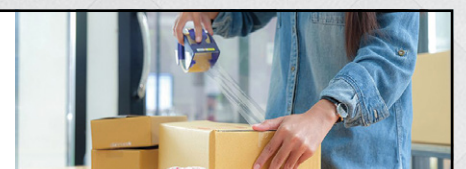

Focus on: Canadian large and small cents

Canadian Coin News Trends is an estimate of retail values of the items listed, based on dealer sales, wholesale prices, auction results and precious metal prices. It assumes that coins are free of damage, problem-free and correctly graded, and that the buyer and seller have equal knowledge and motivation. The estimates contained on these pages are meant as a guide only, since exact values are set by buyers and sellers in fair negotiation.

In this issue, we are focussing on Canadian one-cent coins. It has been almost six months since the last time we reviewed this denomination. There are just a few changes in this issue.

The first change was to 1858 large cents, in lower grades. At every coin show I repeatedly get several requests for an 1858 cent for someone's collection. This has to be happening to other dealers, with very few entry level coins in stock. As a result, I raised the price in Very Good, Fine and Very Fine, by \$10 per coin.

I have also changed the sales data for the 1936 Dot cent. The previous sales reference was for a coin sold in 2013. However, the same PCGS graded SP-65, Red and Brown, sold twice. Once in August, 2019, for \$312,000 US, and again in November, 2021, with this sale resulting in a price realized of \$446,600 Cdn.

There are also several silver bars and rounds in the sale including a 10-ounce Engelhard bar (Lot 184). Considered "scarce," it has a mintage of 250 and comes from the Canadian first series type "A" variation, with serial No. 85909.



This 10-ounce Engelhard silver bar (Lot 184) is considered 'scarce,' with the mintage limited to 250.

"You can expect to see some fantastic examples of numismatics in this auction," Sandham adds, including an 1857 Great Britain Arctic Medal.

It was "retrospectively awarded to all personnel, both officers and men, who participated in expeditions to the polar regions between 1818 and 1855, including those involved in the ill-fated Franklin Expedition of 1845-1848," the description for Lot 865 states. "Out of a total of 1,486 medals awarded, 1,106 were presented to Royal Navy officers or ratings, while the remainder were bestowed upon civilians, scientists, personnel from the French and U.S. navies, as well as employees of the Hudson's Bay Company who actively participated in the search for Sir John Franklin and his crew." While the medal is unnamed, the auction firm

describes the medal as a "beautiful piece featuring attractive shine and sharp detail with minimal handling."

Another fascinating lot features a grouping of five Second World War medals awarded to Pte. C. Cronk of Elliot Lake, Ont., who served in the medical corps. The medals (Lot 863) include the 1939-45 Star, France and Germany Star, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and War Medal. The lot also includes a picture of Cronk in uniform, a War Service Badge Certificate, and a memoriam card.

The sale also features several Canadian tokens, medallions and trade tokens. One of the featured tokens is an 1839 Bank of Montreal Side View graded AU-58.

"A genuine rarity, rarely encountered, this captivating piece showcases impeccable strike details and a charming chocolate-brown hue," states the description for Lot 871. The token was part of the esteemed Doug Robins collection.

Online bidding opened March 15 on icollector.com and colonia-lacres.com/auctions. Live viewing is also available at Colonial Acres' Kitchener, Ont. store until April 3 between 9:30 a.m. and 2 p.m. EDT. Viewing will also be available between noon and 4 p.m. on April 5 and 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. on April 6 at the Hilton Mississauga/Meadowvale at 6750 Mississauga Rd., in Mississauga, Ont. ♦

# Speakers will share their vast knowledge at symposium

Following are details on the topics and presenters at the Second Annual Numismatic Symposium – Money, War and More.

Presented by the University of Calgary's Nickle Galleries in partnership with the Calgary Numismatic Society (CNS), the symposium will be held April 27-28 at Nickle Galleries. Attendance is free, but registration is required. See registration links on page 27.



**Francois Rufiange.**

The symposium opens at 9:30 am on April 27 with a presentation by Francois Rufiange, entitled "My Numismatic Experiences in Afghanistan." With more than 20 years of experience in numismatics, Rufiange enjoys preparing and delivering presentations to collectors at club meetings, shows and conventions. As a professional numismatic photographer, his presentations are packed with outstanding pictures showing minute details, always so important in numismatics. Rufiange is a retired Royal Canadian Air Force aerospace engineer and is

currently the president of the Société numismatique de Québec.

His presentation will be followed by "British Evasions and Counterfeiting" by Stephen Oatway. A past president of the Canadian Paper Money Society and a co-founder and current president of the Canadian Banking Memorabilia Society, Oatway belongs to about a dozen national and international numismatic organizations including the Canadian Association of Numismatic Dealers. In 2023, he was awarded the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association's Charles D. Moore Professional Numismatic Award.



**Stephen Oatway.**

Oatway began collecting as a youngster in 1967. After a brief stint with coins, he quickly moved into tokens by the age of 12. He was fortunate to have some great mentors along the way, including Geoff Bell, Bob Willey, Ron Greene and Don Stewart. In 2000, he started selling British and Canadian tokens on eBay, and that evolved into selling through his websites. His

interests expanded into the world of medals in 2014 and he currently offers many Canadian, British, Belgian and French medals covering many themes, but primarily related to the areas of war and exposition.



**Krista Edmunds.**

The presentation, "Bitcoin: Battle for Peace" will be given by Krista Edmunds. She has more than two decades of expertise in financial markets and innovation, and is a dedicated advocate for women's empowerment in the world of technology. Her passion for Bitcoin, a transformative monetary technology with immense potential to benefit humanity, has led her to launch her own Bitcoin education company to encourage and support the participation of women in this dynamic space. Throughout her career, Edmunds has held key positions at Barclays, a multinational universal bank headquartered in London, England. She earned a bachelor of arts in Italian and management studies from Royal Holloway University of London. In addition, she holds numerous certifications in blockchain, cryp-

tocurrency and financial markets, which attest to her knowledge and expertise in these fields.

Two graduate students from the University of Calgary's Department of History will each give a brief presentation following the Saturday lunch. Bianca Chiacchia will speak on 'Æthelred's Pennies and Medieval Forgeries' and Charlie Boychuk will present, 'Viking King Cnut's Penny'.



**Bianca Chiacchia.**

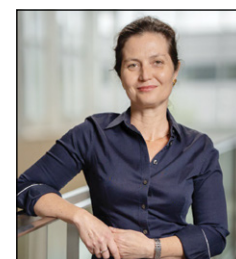
Chiacchia has a Bachelor of Arts in History from the University of Calgary and a Master of Arts in Medieval Studies from the University of York. This fall she will start her PhD, focusing on peacemaking with Vikings from 750-950 AD.



**Charlie Boychuk.**

Boychuk graduated from the University of Lethbridge in 2022 with distinction, earning a Bachelor of Arts in History. He started his post-graduate work in the fall of 2023 at the University of Calgary, studying identity hybridization within Anglo-Scandinavian communities of early medieval England under the supervision of Dr. Courtney Konshuh.

The "Romkomma Project at the Royal Ontario Museum" will be discussed by Kate Cooper, an expert in the archeology, culture and history of ancient Greece and the wider Mediterranean. She specializes in the material culture of Archaic and Classical Greece. She has taught in the United Kingdom at Birkbeck College, London, and the University of Cambridge, and in Toronto at York University and the University of Toronto. She is currently an assistant professor in the historical and cultural stud-

ies department at the University of Toronto. She has also worked as a Greek and Roman museum curator at the British Museum, the Fitzwilliam Museum, Cambridge, and at the Royal Ontario Museum (ROM) in Toronto, where she is now a research associate. She is currently running the "ROMkomma project," funded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council, in partnership with colleagues at the University of Toronto to publish part of the ROM's ancient Greek coin collection.

Saturday's symposium concludes with Rufiange returning to the podium to give a workshop on "Tools for the Collector."

This presentation is an opportunity for participants to update their knowledge of the tools they are using or perhaps should be using. It will also be an opportunity to share experiences. The following tools will be presented: magnifiers (types and magnification), light sources (type, wattage, bulb types), weight scale, micrometer, magnets, two-by-two holders and other storage media, albums, staplers, staple types, chemicals and tools for cleaning coins, software, numismatic magazines, reference books, microscopes, gloves and workspaces. Following the presentation, seven tables manned by CNS members will have these various tools on display, providing a platform for questions.



**Krista Broeckx.**

The symposium returns at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday with Krista Broeckx speaking on "Visualizing the Great War in Bank of Canada Note Design." She is assistant curator of the National Currency Collection at the Bank

## RARE \$500 NOTE REAPPEARS AT AUCTION

A highly graded 1935 Bank of Canada \$500 note that made its first auction debut – in Canada last September – appeared at the Heritage Auctions sale on March 7.

Featured as Lot 24057 in Heritage Auctions' March 7-8 World Paper Money Signature Auction #4049, the coveted banknote sold for \$228,000 US (about \$307,000 Cdn), including buyer's premium. "Any issued example of the \$500 is a prize, as only a few are known to exist, no matter the language," the lot description stated. "In fact, we have offered an issued \$500 only once previously, in 2005. This remarkable example is outstanding, grading About Uncirculated with the coveted PPQ designation, confirming originality. A three-digit serial number adds to the intrigue. A famed rarity, with only 12 pieces confirmed in private hands in the 34th edition of *Canadian Government Paper Money*, this is an extraordinary offering in spectacular, original condition."

With Serial Number A00562 the auction curtain on the "trophy note" was first raised by New Brunswick's Geoffrey Bell Auctions at its Sept. 29, 2023 Sale #29. "A superb rarity that hasn't seen the light of day at any auction," the lot description stated. Lot 530 sold for \$432,000 Cdn. (including buyer's premium).

of Canada Museum in Ottawa. Prior to joining the museum's team in February 2021, she was a curator of historical Canadian art at the National Gallery of Canada. She holds a master's degree in art history and curatorial studies and a bachelor of humanities from Carleton University in Ottawa. She has researched and published work on impressionism in Canada, Canadian woman artists, and the visual representation of Canadian national identity in the arts. She now applies this background to the study of images and symbols on banknotes and coins, with a particular focus on Bank of Canada notes.



**Courtney Konshuh.**

Her presentation will be followed by Courtney Konshuh, who will be delivering the topic, "Viking Coins: Integration and Statemaking." An assistant professor in the department of history at the University of Calgary, she specializes in early medieval history and teaches courses on the Anglo-Saxons and the Vikings. She studied in Tübingen, Germany and Winchester, England, completing her PhD on the *Anglo-Saxon Chronicle* and kings' use of history writing as a medium to legitimize their authority. She works on material culture and ideology in the Early Middle Ages, especially in Northern Europe, and is increasingly using coinage alongside written texts as evidence for ruling ideologies. She is currently looking into the Norman domination of southeast England in the late 11th century.



**Maria Stillwagon.**

Maria Stillwagon will speak on "World War II Invasion Currencies." A numismatist for the last 12 years, the Benicia, Calif., resident is a member of the Diablo Numismatic Society, the Vallejo Numismatic Society and the Fairfield Coin Club. She has

been a part of the Diablo Numismatic Society's board of directors, serving as board member at large, secretary and treasurer. For Stillwagon, who collects U.S. and foreign coins and currency, numismatics represents fine art, history, and a meeting of fellow collectors. She is currently finalizing "Women's Contributions to Numismatics," a presentation she will share at the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association's convention in July.



**Tristan Paron.**

"Coins and Symbols of Authority in Medieval England" will be presented by Tristan Paron, a first-year master's student in the University of Calgary history program under the supervision of Konshuh. His research interests are focused on medieval Northern Europe, with a specific interest in the cultural identity within the Orkney Islands. He has worked as an archaeologist throughout Western Canada over the last two years, which has made him more engaged with using archeology as a vital source for research.

The symposium wraps up with another workshop by Rufiange, entitled "Making Good Purchases."

This presentation and practical workshop will teach the basic skills to make a good purchase. Problem coins will be discussed and participants will have the opportunity to ask themselves this very important question: Should I buy this coin or not? The presentation will discuss:

- Focusing your collection objectives;
- Expenses to watch for;
- Coin condition and its impact on price;
- Differences between a Proof-like and Mint State strike;
- Lustre and eye appeal, cameo effect, coin dipping, fingerprints, black dots and corrosion;
- Cleaning marks, scratches, traces of wear, bag marks versus circulation marks;
- Certified coins.

Participants will also evaluate 20 different coins.

### Money and War focus of Nickle Galleries Exhibition

*The Glory, Blood and Power: Money and War through the Ages* exhibition at the Nickle Galleries runs until April 27.

The exhibition examines the interplay between money, power, and the capacity to wage war, starting in the ancient era and progressing through to the present. It shows the crucial

importance of economic power, as the basic underpinning of all strategic considerations and strategies. This exhibition hopes to draw attention to a connection between war, money and art, an aspect of military power that is often overlooked.

Items on display include German notgeld 1921-23, German coins with swastika during the Second World War, Jewish concentration camp paper bills, POW notes, paper money after the French Revolution, Roman-Jewish war coins from the 1st-2nd century, a crusader coin, Zulu spears, Pacific sword with shark teeth, Roman civil war coins of Caesar, Mark Anthony, Cleopatra and Augustus, Aztec and Maya axes, Chinese knife money, and many more.

The exhibition is curated by Marina Fischer from Nickle Galleries' Numismatic Collection. She holds an M.A. in Ancient History with specialization in Art History from the University of Calgary. She oversees the university's vast money collection of 23,000 objects spanning from the beginning of coinage in the 7th century BCE to the modern period. She is a recipient of a University of Calgary Teaching Award, and lectures frequently in various departments across campus.

against an MS-64 Red Trends listing at \$1,800. As a result, I have raised the MS-63 Red price, and the MS-64 price to \$2,500. A 1920 large cent, graded by PCGS MS-65, Red, sold for \$2,748. This coin displayed 95 per cent red lustre.

Exceptional small cents have been bringing strong results lately. In this same TCNC sale, a 1929 small cent, with the High "9" variety, graded by ICCS MS-64, Red, sold for \$2,748. In the TCNC New Year's sale, on Jan. 21, 2024, a 1936 small cent,

graded by ICCS MS-66, Red, described as full Red, sold for a whopping \$5,228! A similarly outstanding result was for a 1943 cent, also graded MS-66 Red, by ICCS, which realized \$5,085. A 1952 Cent, graded MS-67 RB, by NGC, with reverse toning, sold for \$776.

Elizabeth II young head issues continue to be strong, in MS-66 Red. Recently, a 1960, graded by ICCS MS-66, Red, sold for \$597, while a 1962, in the same grade, sold for \$657. As a result, I have raised all dates, from 1955 to 1963, in MS-66 Red, by 25 to 50 per cent. ♦
